Britons Throng Football Fields

LONDON, Sept. 12 (CP Cable) — British sportsmen, bucked up by the surrender of Italy, thronged football fields Saturday to enjoy a bit of relaxation before knocking down again to the biggest business of war.

The biggest crowd, 30,000 jammed Windsor Park in Belfast to cheer Ireland in its 4-2 victory over the army in the season's first representative match.

Burnley, Sunderland, Aston Villa and Blackpool continued to set a hot pace in the north league each recording its third victory since the season started, without loss. Aston Villa delighted 19,000 with a 4-2 win over Wolverhampton Wolves while Blackpool trounced Manchester City 6-2. Burnley defeated Bury 3-1 and Sunderland best Hartlepool 3-2. Other scores included Liverpool 8, Wrexham 0; Manchester United 4, Everton 1; Burnley 4, Huddersfield 1; Chester 3, Oldham 0; Bradford City 5, Leeds 1; Lincoln 3, Notts Forest 0.

Reading and Queen's Park Rangers head the league south with three wins each, without loss. Arsenal, having a hard time holding its own, eked out a 2-2 tie with West Ham while Crystal Palace defeated Luton 2-1.

Glasgow Rangers, Dumbarton and Hibernian lead the Scottish southern league. Each has won four and lost one. Dumbarton chalked up a 2-1 victory over Falkirk; Hibernian defeated Hearts 1-0 and Rangers dropped a 1-0 decision to Celtic.

Triple Play is Record

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 13 (AP) — A triple play, starting in the outfield, was executed here by New Orleans Pelicans in a southern association play-off game against Nashville, and the managers said it was the first they had seen in combined careers of 57 years in baseball.

Lawyer opened the sixth inning for Nashville yesterday with a double and Mel Hicks walked with the count 3 and 2, and both runners on the move. Third baseman Felix Eiko hit a line drive to centerfield. Carden Gillenwater speared it, threw to Hausmann on second, doubling Sauer who had rounded third base. Hausmann snapped the ball to Gus Mills at first, catching Hicks to complete the triple kill.

Pays Tribute To Sportsman

LONDON, Sept. 13 (CP) — Britain's skimpy wartime newspapers paid tribute to "a very gallant gentleman" in both front page stories and sports-section recollections in telling the country that Hedley Verity died of wounds in an Italian prison camp.

One of the greatest all-rounders in cricket's history, Capt. Verity of the Green Howards, fell mortally wounded on the Plains of Catania while leading his company on an enemy strong point studded with pill boxes.

The company eventually was forced to withdraw but Verity's refusal to leave his side. When last seen the batsman, now reported missing, was supporting Verity's head in front of a blazing corn field.

Eagle Killing Many Water Fowl

A very large eagle has been dining sumptuously on black ducks and plover in the Clark's Creek and Piquid River areas since August 1. This bird of prey visits the areas mentioned only at low tide when the plover and yellow legs feed on the base flats and the ducks are deprived of water protection.

A group of section men working near the mouth of the Piquid River saw this large bird carry off four black ducks in one afternoon. Last Wednesday a local gunner saw the eagle swoop into a large flock of ducks near the mouth of Clark's Creek and rise with a fat black duck grasped in its talons. The hapless duck was caught by the back and was alive and making outcries as it was carried off, only a few feet over the sportsman's head.

Berlin Gleeful Over Release Of Mussolini

LONDON, Sept. 13 (AP) — The German radio which turned with delight to this new subject after weeks of labored explanations of Nazi defeats in Tunisia, Russia, Sicily and Italy. With glees the Berlin script writers told how daredevil German parachute troopers and elite guards had scooped the Duce out from under the noses of his captors, saved him from being a lowly "pawp" of the British, American and Badoglio Governments and set him on the road again to lead Italy back to Axis loyalty.

But the crowning feature of the story, as contrived in Berlin, was that the kidnapping was made possible through the personal friendship and racist brotherhood of Adolf Hitler, who waxed heavily sentimental over the former Duce in his speech last Friday. The German propagandists said it was understood that "Hitler himself prepared the plan for freeing his friend," and gave the orders for carrying it out.

(By The Canadian Press) SEPT. 14, 1918 — The Americans cleared German forces from the heights of the Meuse, and the British advanced near Cambrai and La Bassée. Meitz, Courcelles, Mainz and Karlsruhe were bombed by Allied Airmen. German offer of separate peace to Belgium rejected.

This whole story was treated here with the utmost calm. The British Foreign Office said authoritatively, with dry emphasis, that it knew nothing about where Mussolini was and added that he never had been in British-American hands.

Commandos that some of his top henchmen had been rescued, and that Vittorio Mussolini eldest son of the Italian dictator, was among those arriving in Germany. Niggardly of details, presumably to give the proper spice of suspense, Berlin broadcast added only that Mussolini's guards had orders to shoot him if an attempt were made to free him, but that he got away without a scratch.
