**N.Y. Moves To Ward Off Smallpox Threat**

NEW YORK, April 14 (AP)—The United States Navy Department made about 250,000 units of smallpox vaccine available to health officials today, and the Army sought other supplies, as the city moved to protect its 7,500,000 citizens against the first outbreak of the disease in eight years.

From Millbrook, 75 miles north of New York City, came word that four cases had appeared in that community of 2,000. New York City has five cases, and two persons have died—the first victim an importer who came here from Mexico.

These were the first smallpox fatalities here since 1912.

**Control Of Cancer Of The Skin**

One of the tragedies in the realm of modern medicine is to see the late stages of a devastating skin cancer. Death from cancer arising primarily from the skin should indeed be a thing of the past. The skin is so apparent and accessible to diagnosis and treatment that gross negligence or ignorance on the part of the individual could bring such an unhappy ending.

Malignancy involving the skin is more prone to develop after middle life but can and does occur even at a much younger age. There is little doubt however, in the judgment of experienced clinicians nowadays, that the far advanced hopeless stages are seen more frequently in the extreme age group. This is probably due to the tendency of these old people to entirely disregard or to make light of minor skin changes.

It is the duty of the immediate relatives of these people to see that they are brought in for observation at the earliest signs. This would assuredly eradicate the hopeless cases still occasionally seen in both office and clinic practice. Prompt attention to these early manifestations is the surest safe guard. Prevention will be an attempt in this short address to inform the listener regarding the so-called pre-malignant conditions he should constantly be on the alert for, not only on his own skin but on that of his friends.

Cancer developing in its earliest stages produces no symptoms; appearing growth or inflammation or scaling patch it may grow to considerable proportions before coming under the observation of the physician. Youth is not insurance against cancer and warning signs should not be ignored.

The appearance of small brownish or brownish scaling areas usually referred to by the laity as "freckles," spots, chaps, and hangings, especially in people past middle age or who have been exposed to out of doors. This group should be repeatedly observed for activity by the physician for it left untreated may become cancerous with very little warning.

There also occurs on the skin of the trunks in older people a waxey, greasy elevation, not unlike a drop of candle stick wax, which if irritated, bleeding or growing rapidly, should be removed, or destroyed by accepted methods. Brownish or pigmented moles may be pre-cancerous. The most dangerous mole is situated where irritation by friction may occur by opposing surfaces, for example in the arm-pits, or by clothing, such as collar bands, hat bands, waist bands, suspenders, braces (etc.) it should be removed. Some people have a tendency to pick or handle a mole in which case again removal might be advised.

Certain peculiarly susceptible individuals may develop potentially malignant change in their skin, by irritation from ill-fitting eye glasses or from spectacle bridges. On the mucous membranes of the lip, cancer should be considered as likely to occur on rough spots, crusts, fissures, and cracks, which bleed or persist. In fact, any chronic inflammation occurring within the mouth cavity should be investigated.

Scars from old wounds may at times become malignant and especially if irritated.

The treatment of these early manifestations of cancer depends on the same principle applied to cancer itself—that is, thorough and permanent destruction. In most cases x-ray or radium therapy is the method of choice. It should be remembered however, that certain agents capable of destruction of cancer cells are capable of producing cancer when applied on normal skin for minor complaints. The public should realize this danger and not persist in seeking such treatment for temporary benefit. The writer has observed two deaths in the last four years from such indiscretion. Beware of quacks who advertise certain cures for skin cancers and all well meaning but misguided amateurs who offer free advice as to cures produced by some fantastic means. There is a public hazard in allowing certain self-advertised ill-trained individuals to meddle or interfere with growths on the skin.

In conclusion—Ten years ago, according to the United States Bureau of Census, 6 per cent of deaths due to cancer in the United States were attributable to cancer of the skin and accessible parts. Better cooperation between patient and doctor is reducing this percentage but with the institution of the practice of periodic examination of the skin for suspicious lesions, especially past middle age, complete control of skin cancer can and should be obtained.
