## Monday

**SALLED FOR ENGLAND**—Many friends in Summerside will be interested to hear that Miss Gueney Williams of Summerside, who has been living in New York for some time, sailed from St. John, N. B., last week for England, where she will reside with her uncle, Mr. Sidwell.

**GAVE BIRTH PARTY**—Miss Effie McKay, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. S. McKay, of Summerside, entertained a number of her young friends to a dinner party at the Clifton Hotel last Wednesday to commemorate her twelfth birthday. The children spent a very happy evening in party games.

**ST. JAMES CHURCH**—Rev. R. Moorehead Legate occupied the pulpit of St. James Church yesterday, selecting his morning sermon from the first Psalm, and in the evening based his remarks on two incidents in the life of Peter. The anthem chosen for the morning service was Come Let us Reason Together, Mr. Arthur Bruce taking the solo part in excellent voice. In the evening Mr. Charles McKenzie sang most effectively the beautiful solo Abide with Us.

**ATTENDED CONFERENCE**—The Minister of Agriculture, Hon. W. M. Lea, and W. R. Shaw, Live Stock Superintendent, returned last week from the conference at Moncton with the directors of the Maritime Marketing Board and representatives from the governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. An exhaustive study was made of the whole production, handling and marketing situation in hogs and as a result certain measures were adopted to strengthen co-operative live stock marketing in this province.

Saint Dunstan's University incurred a severe loss in the death of Rev. Father Lawrence Smith, Master of Studies, which took place yesterday morning at 3.25 in the City Hospital. Born in 1886, at Kelly's Cross, Father Smith was a graduate of St. Dunstan's University and St. Augustine's Seminary, Toronto, being a member of the faculty of the former institution since 1919.

Rev. Father Smith entered St. Dunstan's University as a student in 1902, and taught in the public schools for a number of years. He returned to St. Dunstan's and graduated in 1913. After occupying the position of principal of Queen Square School for several years, he entered St. Augustine's Seminary in 1916, and was ordained to the priesthood on Dec. 21, 1919.

**RETURNS FROM EXTENDED TRIP**—Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, M.L.A., returned on Saturday after a business visit to London, England, which he made in company with his partner, Colonel D. A. MacKinnon, D.S.O., in connection with the fur auction sales of the Hudson's Bay Company. Mr. McLure, who was preceded home by Colonel MacKinnon, left England on Feb. 14 on the C. P. R. liner "Metagama" and arrived in Saint John last Monday, travelling thence to Montreal on business for the Hudson's Bay Company. The return trip across the ocean was a fairly good one for this time of year. The passengers, including steers, Journal and cabin voyagers, numbered 700. The Metagama, though a comparatively small steamer, proved an excellent sea-going craft. Mr. McLure expressed pleasure at being home again. He has kept in touch with political and other events, federal and provincial, through the newspapers, and is looking forward with zest to the coming legislative session.

The bride and groom will wear a handsome blue cloth coat with close fitting hat. **AT ROTARY**—At the Rotary luncheon yesterday the speaker was Rotarian Reuben Macdonald and his subject was "The Third Object of Rotary," to encourage and foster the advancement of understanding, goodwill and international fellowship of business and professional men united in the Rotary idea of service. Rotarian H. H. Shaw was in the chair. This was the monthly meeting and President J. A. Macmillan was in the chair while business including the reading of the minutes was submitted. The President announced that good progress was being made in preparing for the concert to be given by the Orpheus Eight under Rotary auspices on March 31st and April 1st. A nominating committee consisting of Past Presidents J. A. Clark, P. W. Turner, J. A. Webster was appointed to nominate a candidate for President to be submitted at the annual meeting in May. That he is the only living survivor of the Quebec Bridge disaster of August, 1907, is the claim of Mr. E. Laguense of Montreal, who arrived in the city last week to superintend the erection of the steel framework of the new Canadian National Hotel, a contract which the Canadian Vickers Co., Montreal, will endeavour to fulfill during the next two months. In that great catastrophe which shocked the world almost twenty-three years ago, seventy-six men were killed, and that eleven men escaped death many to die later as a result of the accident is but a miracle. Mr. Laguense fell 200 feet into the sand and was terribly injured, but ultimately recovered after a long illness.

The work of erecting the hotel is surprising how quickly this loomsome frame work is to begin next week, the steel will be used. It is intended to be placed in place at once a derrick one hundred feet high having a lifting capacity of five tons. The heaviest piece of steel to be lifted will weigh about eleven tons. Accompanying Mr. Laguense is Mr. W. V. Madden, Railway Engineer. Including the twelve skilled mechanics who have come to the city it is expected to employ between forty and fifty workmen, most of whom will be local men. One car load of steel has already arrived and the remainder is en route to the city. Previous to coming here Mr. Laguense was working on the steel construction of a pulp mill in Campbellton.

**Magistrate called as Witness**—The first witness called was Joseph Tweedy, Prohibition Magistrate for Prince Edward Island, who gave his evidence from his notes taken at the trial of Harry Gallant, ("Big Joe"), which was heard before the Court House at Summerside he stated that on information laid by Prohibition Inspector Hayward, a summons was issued against Harry Gallant for having intoxicating liquor in his possession at Summerside. **SUMMERSIDE, Mar. 5**—The adjourned preliminary hearing of the King vs. Davis McNeill, charged with perjury, came up before His Honor Judge Wyatt on Wednesday morning in the Police Court at Summerside. There were no more witnesses for the prosecution called, although it was stated by the prosecuting attorney, Mr. E. H. Strong, K. C., that there were other witnesses that could be produced and will be heard at a higher court if necessary. His Honor read the charge to the prisoner that he was charged with perjury for giving false evidence at the prohibition court at Summerside before Magistrate Tweedy at the trial of Harry Gallant and on such evidence the party was convicted and is still serving his sentence in the Prince County jail. The usual caution being read by the Magistrate to the prisoner, he was asked whether he had anything to say. The prisoner replied in the negative.

**DEATH OF MR. WILLIAM F. WOODSIDE**—The death occurred on Tuesday night at his home in Malpeque, of Mr. William F. Woodside, at the advanced age of 80 years. The deceased had been in failing health all this winter and his death was not unexpected. He was a man of very fine physique and was hale and hearty until a few months ago, working at his trade of blacksmithing and building until his illness. He was born at Clinton and had been married twice, his first wife being Miss Donalds and his second wife Miss Taylor, both of whom predeceased him. Forty one years ago he started business as a blacksmith in Darnley and was well known there for his business integrity and genial manner. He later went to live with his daughter, Mrs. George Mountain, of Malpeque. There are left to mourn three daughters and five sons, namely, William A. James and Melford, at Delaney; Cheloy and McNeill in the West; Mrs. George Cousins, of Kensington; Mrs. Harold Stewart and Mrs. George Mountain, of Malpeque; to all of whom the sympathy of the community is extended.

**COUNTY COURT AT ALBERTON**—The County Court, March Term, was in session all day at Alberton on Tuesday. Judge Inman presided. A number of debt cases were disposed of. The most important of these was an action by the executors of an estate against an Alberton party, the defence being that the defendant did not make the note and did not owe the plaintiffs anything, having settled with the deceased in his lifetime. After hearing a good deal of evidence, judgment was given for the plaintiff for \$188.50. Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., for the plaintiff, and Mr. Wilfred Tanton for the defendant. A case in which there was considerable interest taken was that of Perle McNeill of Alberton, vs. Aneas Gallant of Bloomfield, being an action for negligence in the driving of an automobile in which the plaintiff claims \$300 damages. The plaintiff alleges that at a picnic at Campbellton, Lot 4, on the 8th of July last he was walking into the picnic grounds when the gap or gateway leading to the grounds at a fast rate, the bumper of the car striking him, knocking him down and breaking his leg. The defendant alleges that he was driving very slowly and that the plaintiff was injured because of his own negligence and is therefore not entitled to recover. At 6 o'clock the case was adjourned till May 6th for further witnesses. Mr. Wilfred Tanton for plaintiff and Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., for defendant.

**RECOVERING FROM ACCIDENT**—Mr. W. B. Robertson, who last week suffered a bad shaking up when the sleigh in which he was driving on Longworth Avenue was struck by a car, has almost recovered from his disagreeable experience which necessitated his confinement to his home for several days. A considerable distance in the snow before the car came to a stop, and the sleigh was badly damaged.

**STEEL DERRICK IN ACTION**—The first steel girder of the new Canadian National Hotel was deposited in place yesterday afternoon shortly before 5 o'clock by the great steel derrick 105 feet high. As the 92 foot arm carefully manoeuvred two girders into position it seemed possessed of human intelligence, as it had indirectly in the master engineering running the equipment. The erection of the derrick occupied only fifteen hours. About fifty tons of steel have already arrived at Pool's wharf, and more is on the way including two eleven ton girders, the heaviest individual pieces to be used.

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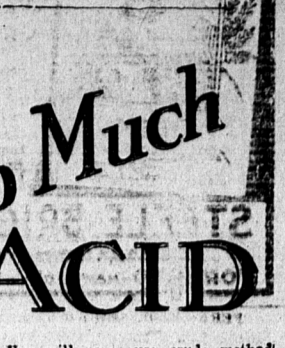
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
