AROUND THE FOX RANCHES

In Saturday's Royal Gazette, it is notified that Letters Patent have been granted for the incorporation of the following fox companies to work in the Island:—The John Agnew Fur Farms, Ltd., with a total capital stock of \$500,000, divided into shares of a par value of \$20 each; The Breeders Ranching Company, Ltd., with a capital of \$25,000, divided into 500 shares of \$50 each; United Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd., with a capital of \$150,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$25 each.

The company now known as The Willow Hill Co., Ltd., proposes changing its name to "The Willow Hill Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd." This is not the only change the company is making in its business. Its capital stock is to be increased. At present the company is capitalized at \$11,400, and it is proposed to increase this to \$450,000; accordingly increasing the number of shares, at present 114 of \$100 each, to 4,500 of \$100 each. Application is being made to the Lieut.-Governor-in-Council for supplementary Letters Patent to provide for these changes.
