The annual meeting of the Directors of the Summerside Driving Park was held a few days ago. A satisfactory dividend was declared, and arrangements were made to hold their usual annual Dominion Day races on Monday July 1st next.

The last regular monthly meeting of the present Town Council was held Monday night, the Mayor and all the Councillors present. There was no business of importance apart from the general routine. It was decided to hold the annual citizen's meeting on Friday next.

The managers of Crystal Rink have made arrangements with Mr. John F. Davidson, the world's greatest skater, to give exhibitions of his wonderful skill in skating on stunts two feet from the ice, high jumping on skates, trick and figure skating in the Rink on Tuesday next the 19th inst.

A MOVEMENT is now in order to have a quarantine station established at Cape Traverse and another at Royalty to prevent the spread of small pox and diphtheria to Summerside. Since communication has been opened via the Capes every precaution should be taken so that the dreaded disease, which so threatened the lives of the people of this province at the time the Stanley was plying between the port and Cape Tormentine, should be stamped out. Why is our Board of Trade so slow, as not to guard against it in the shape of resolutions. Summersiders would surely rather do with one mail a month rather than have one case of smallpox in our midst in a whole season. The Summerside Board of Trade, "should urge upon the Minister of Marine and Fisheries not to allow the withdrawal of one of the steamers, nor the establishment of any other route." Owing to the wonderfully increased winter traffic, the service as at present established between Pictou and Georgetown by the steamers Minto and Stanley, they being inadequate at times to carry the freight as fast as it offers, should serve as another reason why there ought not to be any change made. The Charlottetown Board of Trade will no doubt co-operate with the Summerside Board in this respect.

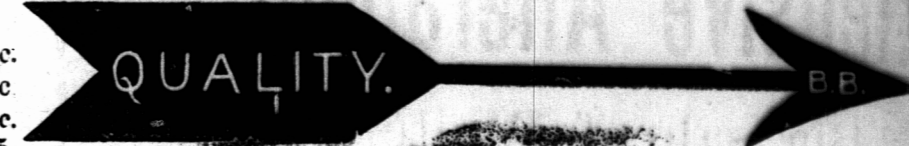
