GOOD RESULTS.—The Department of Agriculture is in receipt of a communication from Mr. H. L. Hewson, in which he states that the graded wool in Ontario and Sherbrooke Counties, Quebec, have brought 30 and 31 cents. This wool was well put up and in good shape. The farmers are very much pleased with the results.

Baderston was greatly appreciated and enjoyed by the large congregation assembled. AN ISLANDER.—Norton, N. B., is to be settled with the new minister. The Presbytery of St. John sustained a call to Rev. R. H. Stovall, of Harcourt, N. B., a native of P. E. Island. Mr. Stovall accepted the call and will be inducted to the pastoral charge on the evening of May 31. Congratulations are in order for both congregation and people, and the best wishes of the Presbytery and the Church generally will be theirs in this prospective union, says St. John exchange.

LOBSTER SITUATION.—A number of the lobster factories made their first pack on Monday of this week says the Picton Advocate. The lobster men will certainly have a short season this year. The season closes on June 26. This will mean only 36 days for many of the factories, all told, and when you take the stormy weather out of it, it will be a good deal less. Lobsters are worth about \$18 per case in on-shore ponds on the London market at present. Some of the local packers have sold their catch at \$13 per case, as against \$19 per case last year. Quite heavy ice on the north shore of Prince Edward Island is retarding lobster fishing but the catches at the north end of the island as far as Cape West, which is the limit of the area open this season of the year, still continue exceptionally good. The lobsters in Richmond Bay are the best caught in these waters for many years. This would lead to the impression that the whole Island North Shore catch will be above the average this season.

A RICH GIRL HELD AS INCORRIGIBLE

NEW YORK, May 31.—"I was wrong, and mother was right," was the declaration made today in the Yorkville magistrate's court by Miss Eugenia Kelly, the nineteen-year-old daughter of Mrs. Edward Kelly, of New York, an heiress to a \$1,000,000 estate, when she would renounce night life in the sabarets and tango parlors of Broadway. Mother and daughter were reconciled, and the charge of incorrigibility brought by Mrs. Kelly was dropped. Both left the court room together. Within a few days they will be on board a steamer bound for the San Francisco exposition by way of the Panama canal.

Those interested in the case believed that Eugenia had given up her former tango association and that chapter in her life is closed. There remains only the inquiry to the girl's

financial affairs, the search to recover the \$10,000 worth of jewellery she is believed to have sold or given to some one to pawn. It is probable that Miss Kelly will tell her mother to what extent she has involved the estate by the giving of notes, and that she will tell who introduced her to the Produce Exchange Bank and where she got \$4,000 she deposited there.

The reconciliation was brought about through the efforts of George G. Gillespie, the lawyer, who has represented Mrs. Ralph Thomas, Miss Kelly's sister. His efforts were supplemented by several Catholic priests, friends of the family, and John F. McIntyre, counsel for Mrs. Kelly.

THE CLOSE OF THE LOBSTER SEASON

HALIFAX, May 28.—The lobster fishing and packing season west of Halifax ends May 31st. Three days grace is allowed for the removal of

all gear, but no fishing will be allowed during the three days. Shipments of lobsters caught previous to June 1st, may be made up to and including June 2 factories are permitted to pack up to 6 p. m. on June 2. The western season opened on December 15. The season east of Halifax did not open until April 1st, and closes on June 30.
