THE CONSENT OF THE GOVERNED

Some Canadian journals, and not a few of the anti-expansionist newspapers of the United States now find satisfaction in quoting the words of the famous Declaration of Independence, that "All Governments derive their just power from the consent of the governed." Now the same declaration is held in great reverence in the Republic as a sort of Magna Charta of the people's liberties, but how can it be reconciled with the forcible imposition of American rule upon the unconsenting Filipinos?

The fact is that the Declaration framed by Thomas Jefferson cannot be reconciled with the policy of conquest now being pursued in the Philippines, and it is so much the worse for the Declaration. That famous document emanated from a people in revolt, and cannot be very strictly adhered to by an established government for any considerable length of time. W. J. Bryan in quoting its words, says that this policy has been adhered to by the American people for more than a century, but his statement is contrary to historical facts.

The American Indians have been governed without their consent from the beginning. The consent of the people of Louisiana and Florida were neither given nor asked when their country was purchased from France and Spain. In South Carolina and Mississippi, the negro population, although more numerous than the white people, are not allowed to vote and are governed without their consent. But a more conspicuous instance still was when the southern states, after setting up a confederacy of their own were whipped into subjection.

It is not a mere theory but certain conditions that govern the policies of states in emergencies. Gladstone gave a pledge that Britain would evacuate Egypt, but at present, long after the date fixed for the evacuation, Britain not only holds Egypt but is looking to establish a continuous Empire from Cairo to the Cape. So with the United States in the Philippines. The task of establishing the new authority there may be a difficult one, but other considerations than "the consent of the governed" will determine the course to be pursued.

The prorogation of Parliament, which was promised for yesterday seems to have been postponed till tomorrow, if not longer.

The St. John Globe tells that in the recent lavish creation of Queen's Counsel by the New Brunswick Government "all shades of politics are represented and every degree of merit." Still it is objected that the one colored man at the bar of the Province has been omitted from the list.

It now appears that the Dominion surplus for the year ended with 30th June last was \$5,200,000. This is a handsome balance to have on the right side of the ledger, but it is by no means the largest in Canadian history. In 1881-2 the surplus was \$6,316,352, and in the following year \$7,064,492. Those were the days when the late Sir Leonard Tilley was Finance Minister, and to him rather than to Mr. Fielding must be credited the largest surplus that has been. Mr. Fielding is not done yet, however, and may say with Mr. Tarte, "Wait till you see us next year."

An official circular issued by Premier Greenway tells that six or seven thousand men from outside will be required to assist the farmers of Manitoba with this year's harvest.

Last year over 5000 went in an about the same number the previous year. It is well-known that in the prairie country a farmer can plant a larger crop than the same number of hands can take care of in harvest time. There are 35,000 farmers in Manitoba and if only one in five of that number requires an additional man it will still require 7000 men. It is understood that the railways will, as usual, give cheap harvest excursions, good for return at any time within three months. The wages to be paid, Mr. Greenway intimates, will be in accordance with the ability and experience of the workmen.

The esteemed Examiner is still not satisfied with this journal's attitude toward the Local Opposition in the Hillsboro bridge affair. It says, "As the Opposition could not and did not defeat the government's plan, the question need not now be considered." But the question will not drop, because the Opposition may and will be fairly charged with what they tried to do. Again the Examiner says: "But the opposition could not carry out its plan, any more than it could hinder the Government from passing a bad License Law for Charlottetown!" In trying to defeat the "bad license law" the Opposition did their duty and are entitled to credit, just as they must be blamed for their mistake in opposing the bridge project. But as to the bad license law, did we not read in the Examiner recently that it was in favor of the License principle? R. S. V. P.

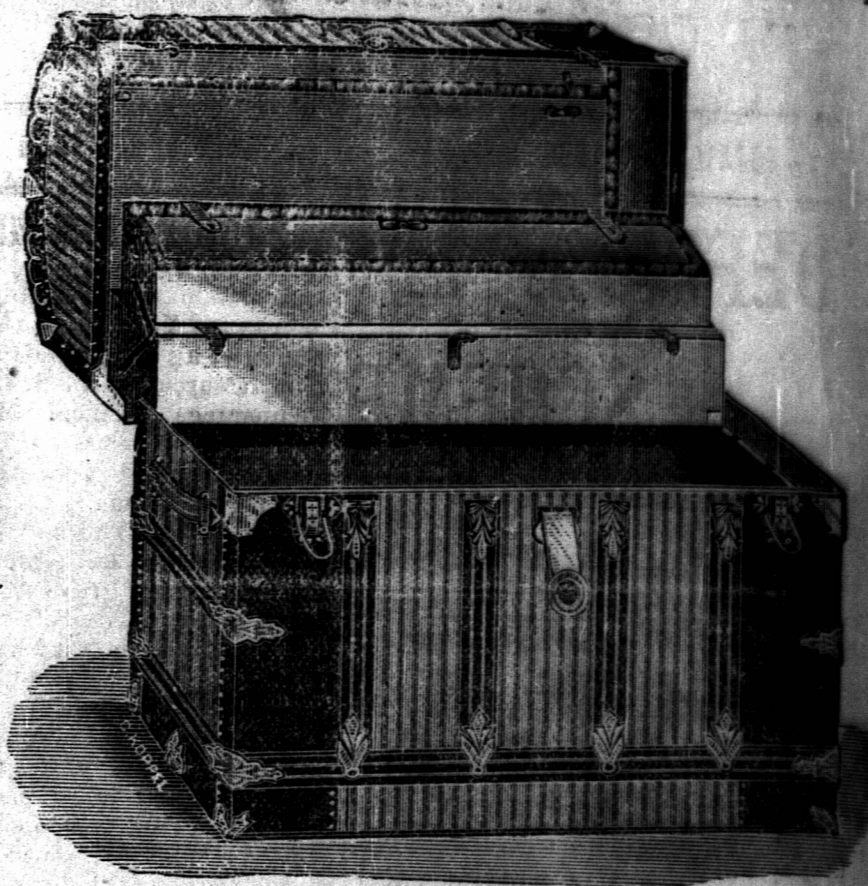

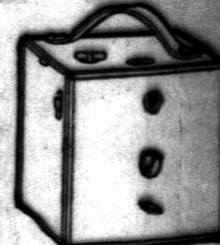
