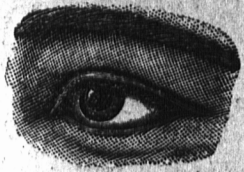

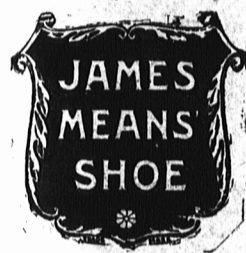

ADAM AND MRS. HICKEN, Commercial Cross, were in the city yesterday. It will be remembered that it was Mrs. Hicken who received the \$2000 life insurance a few days ago from her uncle the late Alexander Matheson, Carson City, Nevada.

ARTHUR PHILLIPS, a lad of the eastern part of the City was on Thursday hurt by the explosion of a large fire cracker which he had plugged in one end with a bullet. The bullet went the wrong way and inflicted a nasty cut on the boy's face.

SEVEN building lots, 53 x 75 on Upper Hillsborough and Oxbow streets were sold by R. B. Northon, auctioneer, yesterday. Five were sold to A. L. Beer, and the other two to Andrew Ritson and W. W. Harper. The prices ranged from \$125 to \$140 each.

THE death took place at Pugwash on Apr 12th, says the Pictou Advocate, of Mrs. A. Louisa, widow of the late Charles Creed, Sturgeon, and daughter of the late Charles B. DeWolfe. One sister Miss Mary DeWolfe, of Pictou and one brother, J. Edward DeWolfe, of England, survive her.

DR. ANDREW McPHAIL, formerly of Charlottetown, now of Montreal, was called away suddenly a few days ago to attend on his father-in-law President Burdard of the British American Bank Note Company, who had been taken suddenly ill of heart disease at Los Angeles. Mr. Burdard is a millionaire and last fall was married to his nurse. His illness follows an attack of grippe and the patient's condition is reported as serious.

In fourteen days the Ottawa Y. M. C. A. raised \$300,000 for a magnificent new building. On the last day of the canvass the sum of \$67,000 was raised. The initial subscription of the canvass was given by W. C. Edwards & Co for \$20,000. This was undoubtedly the most wonderful Y. M. C. A. undertaking ever accomplished in Canada and one of the greatest of the world. The Halifax Y. M. C. A. has sold its old building for \$20,000 and a new building will be begun soon. They retain the right to use the old building for fifteen months. In the other cities of Canada as well as in Charlottetown the good work is going on.

It has not yet apparently been possible to provide any means of ferrying people across the North River at the point where the North River Bridge was carried away a few days ago by floating ice. This makes it decidedly awkward for residents on the other side of the North River who want to come to town, or for people wanting to cross the other way, as they are either compelled to get a row boat or if driving, to take their team around by Moore's mills at Milton, further up the River. The Commissioner of Public Works endeavored to get a tug to maintain a ferry service at the bridge, but could not succeed as tug owners considered it a dangerous job. The expense of the bridge will commence without delay, and material is being taken to the place. An effort will be made to maintain a rowboat ferry between Dockendorff's shore, and Brighton on this side, to accommodate people coming to and from Charlottetown.
