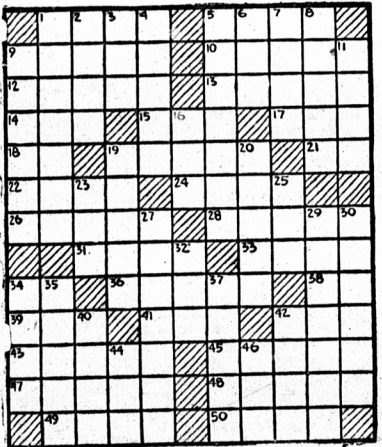

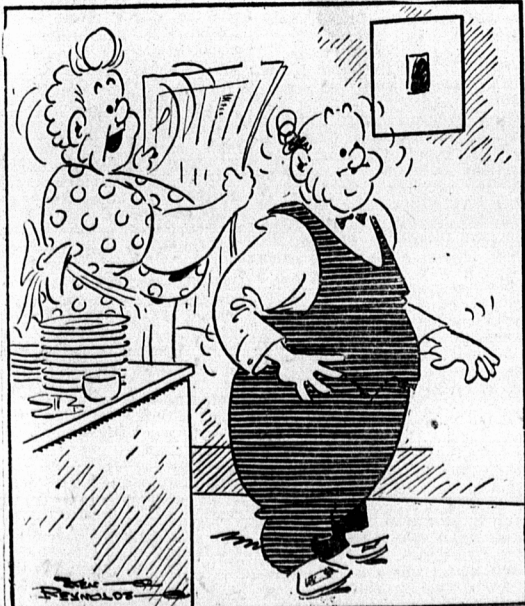

Contract Bridge

A LESSON TOO WELL LEARNED
Many bridge players learned the lesson of adequate trump support—well-controlled and automatically go to a spade contract. If South can rebid the suit, than to a notrump contract.

South dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

Mr. Moyle makes the point that in games ranging from average to good this is the bidding that might well be expected:

South West North East
1♦ Pass 2♦ Pass
2NT Pass 3NT Pass
Pass Pass

It is obvious that on West's natural opening lead of the heart four, with East playing the ace and returning the heart three, the contract is doomed, inasmuch as the defenders established an establish suit before declarer can establish his. It is equally obvious that a four-spade contract on the North-South hands cannot be defeated. South will lose only one spade trick, one heart and the diamond ace. The point is made that since

South's bidding cannot be criticized in any respect, we must hold North responsible for landing in the wrong contract. This is a fair judgment. North's two-diamond response on the first round is correct, of course, but when South then bids two notrump, North should not take it for granted that the heart suit is well-controlled and automatically go to a spade contract. By doing so he is not (as so many players falsely think) showing strong spade support—he is merely announcing that his hand, because of its distribution, seems better adapted to a spade contract. If South can rebid the suit, than to a notrump contract. This is a point that players will do well to bear in mind.

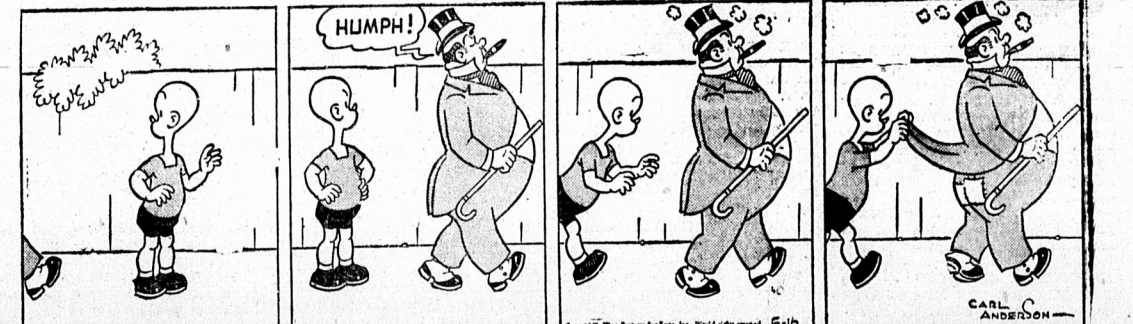
