HOW THEY KEPT THE LAW.

The list of licensed liquor sellers and their records as violators of the law of the land published yesterday contains food for thought. Twenty-five of the number it appears have been convicted in the courts. These include men who violated the Scott Act during the last three years of its operation in Charlottetown, and during the term when it was previously in force; and some who were convicted of disobeying even the scanty restrictions of the Liquor Regulation Act. What a lawless trade it is!

The aggregate number of convictions against these 25 men is 145, or an average of nearly six convictions to each. A few far exceed this average, and were convicted from 13 to 15 times each, and yet these men are now by the action of the government and legislature "authorised to sell liquor," if only they will pay \$100 for the privilege. No matter how lawless, or how many times he has been proved to be lawless, the applicant can receive his permit if only he will pay for it!

We do not wish to detract anything from the credit fairly due to the men on the list of licensees against whom no convictions are recorded. A few of these were not in the trade when the Scott Act made it illegal. This is also to their credit. Doubtless there are men who would not violate the Scott Act who will now engage in the trade because it has been declared legally respectable. But it is to be observed that in many cases illegal sale was conducted in the Scott Act days, in the same places that are now occupied by licensees against whom there is no record of conviction. And in cases brought into court a brothier, or mother, or the barkeeper of a present licensee was then convicted. These numerous violators do not appear in THE GUARDIAN'S list.

It was put forward as the laudable object of the License Act to close the "dens" and confine the sale to comparatively "respectable" places. The result is as we have shown. The trade is still in the old hands and the majority of the licensees are convicted violators of the law. Practically the only difference is that now the Government of the Province has become a sharer with these men in the profits of their trade.

General Grant thirty years ago thought that the war pensions of the United States had then reached their maximum. As a matter of fact they steadily increased in number and volume down to the date of the war with Spain. The new crop has been very plentiful in proportion to the number of casualties, and every day of the warfare in the Philippines is adding to the number of pensions. A year ago the pensioners of the Republic numbered very nearly a million. Now the Commissioner of Pensions tells that he has before him 625,000 applications, either for new pensions or an increase, or re-rating of old ones. Some 16,000 new pensions have been already granted, growing out of the Spanish war, but this is a mere drop in the bucket of what is to come.

ARE AGAINST LICENSE

Mr. John A. Sellar was recommended to this Conference to be received on probation as a candidate for the ministry. Mr. Sellar is a native of Union Road, on the Little York Circuit, and at the present time is engaged in the teaching profession at Bideford. Mr. W. A. Pepper, son of the Pastor of the Bideford Circuit, was also recommended to be received on probation. Both candidates passed the preliminary examinations prescribed by the Church, before the usual examining Committee in May with high marks, and at the usual Theological examination before the session on Tuesday were cordially passed.

At the evening session there was a good audience. The Rev. John Goldsmith, of Alberton delivered a most interesting lecture on "Chinese Gordon, the Saint Soldier," illustrated by stereopticon views. The lecture held the attention of the audience closely for an hour and a half. The collection which amounted to between five and six dollars was in aid of the Sustentation fund.

On Wednesday morning the Annual District met at 9 o'clock. The following members were present: Revs. Dr. Sprague, G. C. P. Palmer, Henry Pierce, A. E. Chapman; also the following laymen, D. Rogers, Geo. Johnson, and F. H. Pickering. After devotion exercises the Rev. W. H. Pepper was elected Secretary, and the Rev. A. C. Chapman, Statistical Secretary.

An examination of the financial condition of the District showed a healthy increase. The following amounts were raised:—Missionary Fund, \$683.87; Supernumerary Fund, \$157.10; Educational Fund, \$61.33; Contingent Fund, \$34.27; General Conference, \$24.00; Union Church Relief, \$9.56; Sabbath School Aid Fund, \$4.14; Sustentation Fund, \$197.8; Women's Missionary Society, \$1057.97; General Epworth League, \$305. Total amount raised for Connexional Funds during the year amounts to \$2665.37, an increase of over one hundred dollars upon last year.

The spiritual work of the Church has been faithfully prosecuted during the year with gratifying results. Despite many losses through removals and deaths there is a net gain of 34 members, the present number being 1594 against 1560 last year.

Inquiring into the status of Sabbath schools and Young People's Societies revealed progress made in many departments.

RESOLUTION RESPECTING LICENSE ACT.
The following resolution was discussed for some considerable time, and was passed by a large majority:

Whereas,—This District Meeting has learned that the Legislature of this Province has passed a License Act, permitting for a consideration, the open sale of intoxicating liquors in Charlottetown;

And whereas,—It is apparent that the concession to the Liquor traffic at the Capital must react upon the Temperance sentiment of the Province at large and encourage the promoters of the traffic to renew their efforts to revive the traffic in the counties;

And whereas,—We believe that such a step would be of a decidedly retrogressive character and would inevitably prove extremely damaging to the moral and material interests of the Province;

And whereas,—For the foregoing and many other reasons we, as a church, are determined and unalterably opposed to the Government of this country entering into a kind of partnership with this nefarious traffic and deplore the fact that we are perforce compelled to participate in the profits arising therefrom;

Therefore resolved,—That we do condemn most unequivocally the Legislature referred to above and trust that the Temperance workers of Charlottetown will, at the first opportunity, make every possible effort for the re-enactment of the Scott Act.

And further,—That we urge our people throughout this district to be upon the alert lest the enemy should stage a march upon them and by the devious methods for which the friends of the traffic are notorious, may succeed in weakening the position which has already been gained as the result of so much toil and sacrifice on the part of the Temperance people of this section of the Province.

A vote of thanks was tendered the chairman (Dr. Sprague) for the efficient discharge of the duties of his office during the past two years. Dr. Sprague will leave the Island at the annual Conference much regretted by many friends.

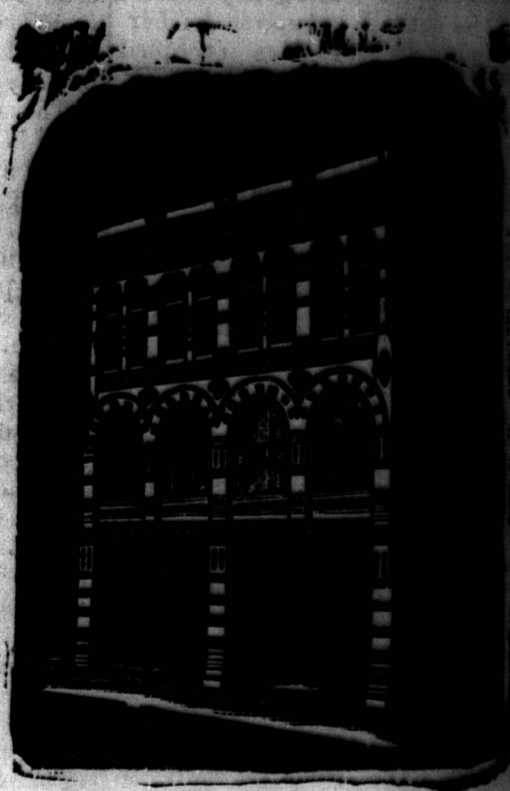
