On the 27th of Oct., Charles W. Hume died from the effects of a fatal accident while at work in the American smelting works at Murray, Utah. The funeral services were held on Nov. 4th at 120 Austin St., Cambridge, Mass., and were conducted by Wm. J. Cam. L. pastor of the Scotch Presbyterian church, Cambridge, Mass. The body was interred at Cambridge cemetery. Charles W. Hume, was the son of Peter Hume, Brooklyn P. E. Island but for some years was a resident of Cambridge where he had his residence. He was about thirty years of age and there worked up to Oct. 27th the day of the fatal accident which resulted in his death. He leaves a wife, one daughter, Julia, and an adopted son John F. Hume all of whom reside in Cambridge. There are also five brothers, three sisters and an adopted father living in P. E. Island. To the sorrowing family and friends the sympathy of any friends will go out.

An inquest of case was begun yesterday at the coroner's office. It was a bigamy suit preferred by Mrs. Ethel Moore against Dr. George E. F. Moore, dentist, of Crapaud, W. A. Weeks appeared for the prosecutor and W. S. Stewart for the defendant. The complainant testified that her maiden name was Heckbert. She was married in 1891 to Dr. Geo. E. F. Moore, dentist, at the home of Capt. John T. Dewar, by Mr. Weaver, a minister of the Christian Church in the presence of a number of stentaneous people. After the marriage they lived in Montague and had a family of four children, two boys and two girls. They lived together for about five years. He then went away to Chicago for two or three months. My husband had not provided for me and I went to live at my former home. When he came back he went to board and did not come to live with me or provide any means of bringing up my family. I asked him to do so. This condition continued about two weeks and I then went to Boston with my mother, taking two of my children with me. I came home again in the spring and lived at Montague. Dr. Moore was still there. I met him and he asked me if I would go back to live with him. We had some words and I did not see him again until today. I was in Boston in September of this year. I heard he was married to another woman. I went to the City Hall in Boston where marriages are registered and I saw the marriage certificate of Geo. E. F. Moore and Ethel Fraser. It was dated 1904. Ethel Fraser came from Montague. I know her. I heard they were in Boston about a week before they were married. At the time of the second marriage he was practising in Crapaud. The case was then adjourned for a week when evidence for the defence will be brought in.

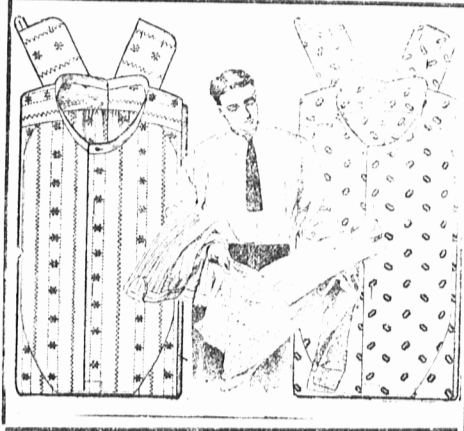

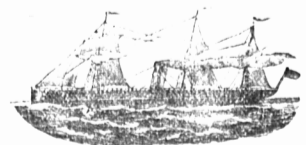
