THE MUTUAL LIFE OF CANADA

TORONTO, March 31st.—An important decision of interest to all holders of life insurance policies has been made by the Court of Appeal for the Province of Ontario.

The decision emphasizes the fact that a policy holder should watch carefully to see that his policy is in force beyond all possibility of dispute.

It was contended by plaintiff's counsel, and concurred in by the trial judge, that the cash surrender value applicable in the case of the nonforfeiture provision was something different from the amounts set out in the table of cash surrender values in the policy.

The decision places an important responsibility on insurers who do not keep their premiums paid up regularly and who are depending on the nonforfeiture clause to keep their policies alive.

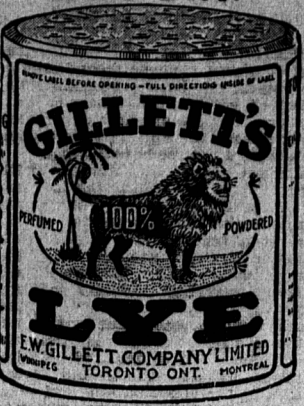
