**Stresses Value Of Salvage Conservation**

The conservation of salvage was the subject of an informative address at a Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by Mr. Charles LeFerie, director of national salvage, Ottawa. Mr. LeFerie explained that there are about 2,000 voluntary salvage committees across the Dominion, and to quote the memorable words of Prime Minister Churchill in 1940: "never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few." It was through the efforts of the few who exerted themselves in the collection of salvage that we owe the improvement in present conditions.

Mr. LeFerie pointed out that through the collection of thousands of tons of old rubber tubes and old grade scrap rubber, reclaimed rubber can now be used instead of the crude material. The supply of scrap metal and iron, two very important materials, has increased considerably during the past year.

In connection with conserving waste kitchen fats Mr. LeFerie said that Prince Edward Island has played its part well. About 70,000 pounds have been shipped from this Province to the renderers for making explosives.

Waste paper, however, is badly needed, also cartons. Tin cans are needed but as yet there is no detinning process plant in Canada. It may be possible in the future, to send cans to the United States for this purpose. Any tin processed will represent a reserve stock for the use of the United States.

In conclusion Mr. LeFerie stated that Canada has been one of the most wasteful countries in the world for which reason it is necessary to salvage. It is very difficult to educate the people in this direction. The most dangerous enemy of today, he argued, is not Hitler nor Togo, but complacency and inertia. "We are doing well, but it is not over yet, and we cannot afford to relax our war efforts as long as there is a single one of our boys and girls within range of the enemy fire."

Mr. LeFerie expressed appreciation of the work of all who had helped in the salvage campaign here, especially Mr. S. McBeth, provincial supervisor, and Mr. James Robison, chairman of the local committee.

Rotarians N. D. McLean and Heath McIntyre jointly presided at yesterday's luncheon. Guests included Messrs. Douglas Cowie and R. L. Young, Montreal, I.A.C., Frank Anderson, R. A. F., R. S. McBeth, Harry W. MacKiel, Sackville, past district governor and Canadian director of Rotary International, who read the Rotary message to two new members, Leith MacLeod and Darrel McGuire.

**RAILWAY IS PRODUCING OIL FOR TRAINS**

VERMILION, Alta., Nov. 1 — With control of 620 acres here, Canmar Oils Limited, a subsidiary of the Canadian National Railway, has begun production of fuel oil for the railway's locomotives in Western Canada. Already 20 wells have been drilled, out of a planned 50, and 10 are now producing 350 barrels a day. "We are opening the well" R. C. Vaughan, O.N.R. president said, "is a wartime measure of precaution to secure an adequate supply and reserve of fuel oil for our western services. Operation in British Columbia and Alberta is, at present, largely dependent on Pacific Coast ports and any interruption to this supply would seriously disrupt our service. Bituminous coal is so scarce that it is impossible to use it in place of oil."

**MADE GOOD SHOWING**

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 1 — "Not a single fire was reported during the Prevention Week on any property of the Canadian National Railways throughout Canada," stated R. C. Carrington, Insurance Commissioner for the National System. Mr. Carrington said fire prevention is a constant problem for inspectors in each of the three regions of the Canadian National Railways.

**Vegetables Keep Well in Shallow Outdoor Pits**

In shallow outdoor pits, root vegetables can be piled in conical heaps, insulated against freezing, by heavy layers of straw or excelsior, and covered with earth which will keep them sufficiently moist to prevent drying and shrinking.

The only expense involved is the labor and the insulating material, yet this method keeps the vegetables better, as a rule, than expensive storage rooms. It involves inconvenience in that the pit must be opened up in order to get at the vegetables inside it, and it must be removed together. But by making each pit small, and mixing the vegetables stored in it, a supply sufficient for one or two weeks can be dug up at a time. They can be covered in the garage for the period necessary to use them.

The illustration shows the method allow some ventilation.
