Big Vic Raschi of New York Yankees muffed a ninth-inning rally by Cleveland Indians and defeated the world champions 3-2.

The victory broke the Yankees' four-game losing streak.

\$30.00 per hundred. This number will be augmented by a bonus from the shipper of one hundred eggs and this in addition to an approximately similar number received from a local source will furnish at least eighteen hundred Chukker partridge eggs for hatching.

Incidentally arrangements have been made with the Experimental Station for incubating the eggs in lots of 300 or slightly over and the chicks will be distributed in lots of 100 to interested sportsmen in the three counties for brooding. Experience has shown that Chukker partridge chicks are easily brooded. They are hardy and show quick results from the proper food and attention. A simple brooder plan has been drawn up and a proper food formula will be supplied with each batch of chicks handed over for brooding purposes. Chukker partridge are larger than Huns and their bright red legs distinguish them from the Hun. They are more inclined to skulk and run, somewhat after the manner of the pheasant, and are not considered as sporty hunters as the Huns. They lie to a dog better than pheasants and are reported to be meaty well flavoured table birds.

With the advent of a new species of upland game bird it behooves sportsmen to initiate some form of crowd control. Quite a few pheasant nests have been reported destroyed by crows this season and only one mother pheasant so far has been seen with a brood of five young. The crow is yet a actor to be reckoned with for a tender fledging pheasant is as welcome on a crow's menu as a farmer's chicken or young wild duck. As mentioned earlier the crow does a lot of good as well as harm. He does harm in two ways. He eats eggs and young game birds and also destroys countless robins and other song birds that are friends of the farmers on account of the insects and grubs they eat.

No one need worry over any danger of the crow being exterminated in the States. The game and farmers have conducted a campaign against the crow for years. Crow shoots have been held and their 'roosts' have been dynamited at night when their sands have been killed or maimed by a single blast. During the day engineers place sticks of dynamite in the tree tops that are connected with a single wire and the fireworks are touched off after the crows have settled down for the night.

In spite of this apparent wholesale destruction observers are of the opinion that the crow population is barely held in check. There are some who contend that the crow population is on the increase in the corn growing States of the mid west natural conditions favour the crow. The crow has no natural enemies to keep him and his progeny in check with the exception of the Great Horned Owl and old 'hooty' has no special ven for crow on his diet. They kill a crow apparently only when the spirit moves them and this is not very often.

Man is the crow's only real enemy in one sense and in another he is the black and white friend of the crow thrives in agricultural areas. When man finds no crow worth the name 'Jim' yet when he starts clearing the land and begins to grow crops 'Jim' crow moves in.

The crow makes a sporting target and it takes a good shot to score on a 50-50 basis. Last year I loaned my stuffed Horned Owl decoy and crow call to a friend who had a yen to clean up the crows in his district. I told him at the time he'd do well if he got a crow with every five shells. He was chuckling to himself when he left but he wasn't laughing out loud when I saw him a week later. He admitted he used up a box of shells before he could score with any degree of consistency. Don't laugh... did you ever try to shoot a crow when it was doing a power dive on an owl decoy with the throttle wide open? I prefer to intercept a fliplr on their way to 'roost' on a dull windy evening in late August or September and indulge in a bit of mass shooting. It's very much like shooting black ducks only the crow makes a tougher target. Try it sometime. You'll not only have a good first sport but you will also give the ducks a break. After all is said and done the depredations of the crow are more noticeable in respect to our black ducks than either the Huns or pheasants. Upland game birds appear to have greater reproductive powers and are not beset with the hazards of migration. Give our black ducks a break. The breaks possible... they need them.
