Elderly Man Assaulted and Robbed In Home

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., July 12.—Beaten and tortured by a bandit seeking his money, 74 year old Charles King was in critical condition at his Alder Point home tonight while Royal Canadian Mounted Police scoured the nearby woods in search of Francis McCready, a youth who resided in the same village.

Apparently suffering severe pain, the aged lobster factory employee told the police his assailant had struck him with a stock of a heavy rifle and then held lighted matches under his arms and feet when he refused to reveal the hiding place for his meagre earnings.

King said he finally produced \$3.50 which the bandit grabbed and carried away without looking for more money. How much more cash he had in the little dwelling where he lives alone the victim did not disclose.

He said he had been paid off a few days ago after working several weeks at a lobster factory. Sitting in his home yesterday he was surprised when a youth carrying a rifle rushed through the doorway and demanded his money. He attempted to remonstrate with the visitor, he said, when he was struck a heavy blow which broke the stock of the gun.

As he lay back helplessly, still refusing to disclose the place where he kept his money, the old man was tortured with matches. Telling his story today, he showed the police burns on his arms and feet.

"Weak and suffering pain from his injuries and burns, King was found by neighbors who asked for assistance in North Sydney. The police were still in the woods late tonight and no trace of the missing McCready had been found.

FIRST AID FOR VACATION HOUSEHOLDS

During the summer months many folk find themselves away from their usual abode and the home remedies and doctors, that it is well to consider some emergency measures for the smaller ills and accidents—using the means of allaying pain easy to find in any home.

What would you do for BURNS? Vaseline, ointment, or soft cloths are used for emergency treatment—but are not sterile. To sterilize, put some vaseline in a boiler and bring to boiling point and cool. To apply, use the handle of a spoon that has been boiled. For acid burns, use any form of alcohol externally.

What would you do for a person who is FAINTED? For faint or shock, have person lying down, head low, loosen all clothing, give plenty fresh air. Smelling salts to nostrils helps. Cold cloths to head, give stimulating drinks as soon as patient can swallow—hot tea, hot coffee, milk, fresh light nourishing food. Keep feet warm. NEVER GIVE ALCOHOL.

What would you do for a CHILL? Hot foot bath, hot lemonade, hot orangeade, hot ginger tea, or even hot water. Any of these are helpful. Keep patient warm. Laxative if needed. If fever or temperature follows, call a doctor. DO NOT GIVE ALCOHOL.

What would you do for a COMMON COLD? Put patient to bed. Give laxative, and abundance of lemonade or orangeade, since lemons and oranges cause poisons to leave body through kidneys or the skin. If lemons or oranges are not available, a half teaspoonful of baking soda in a glass of hot water may be sipped every hour. Put heat to feet. Use plenty of hot water as a drink, but NOT ALCOHOL—a heart depressant.

What would you do for INFLUENZA? Same treatment as for cold, but hot coffee may be given as a stimulant for the heart. Cold compress on the throat often found helpful. Do not give alcohol as it is a depressant. If fever or temperature keeps up, send for a doctor.

What would you do for INDIGESTION? Give a half teaspoonful baking soda in hot water, or a dessert-spoonful of Milk of Magnesia in
