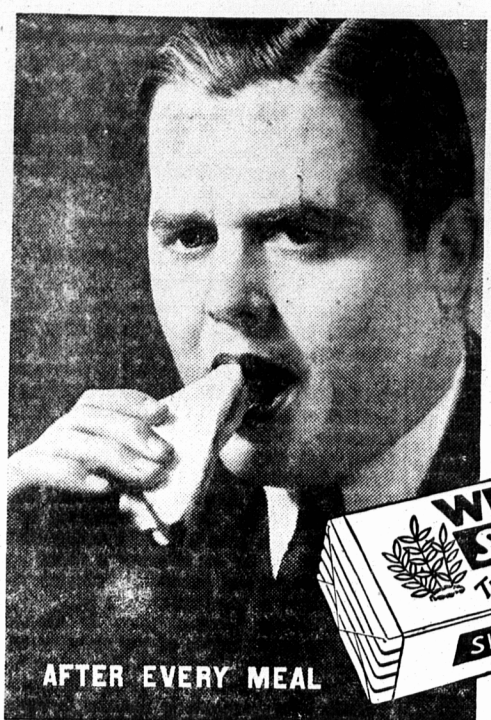

(Continued from page 1) whatever fate awaited. Nearly all of eastern and northern Shanghai, where much British property is located, has been reduced to a smoking waste. Estimates based on authoritative information placed the property loss at \$100,000,000. NANKING China Aug 22—(AP)—Many foreigners here prepared today to leave immediately for Hankow, up the Yangtze River, as officials expressed belief this capital of China was doomed to increasingly numerous and severe bombardments by Japanese air forces. Three Japanese bombing planes tried to raid Nanking late tonight taking advantage of bright moonlight, but were turned back before they could do any damage. Searchlights held them constantly in view for the Chinese anti-aircraft batteries. Nanking has been bombed several times but with little damage. High officers of the Chinese air force declared, however, their air force had proved superior to the Japanese and that nearly 50 enemy planes have been shot down or captured since the conflict broke out. Several Chinese pilots have emerged as national heroes from the aerial combats of the past week. The Associated Press correspondent talked with several of these on a tour of military airfields around the capital. The results appeared to be insignificant from the military point of view, but tragic from the viewpoint of hundreds of non-combatants, killed, maimed or ruined. A shell of undetermined origin plunged into the heart of the international settlement, wounding four Chinese, at Kiangse and Poochow roads. Considerable damage was done and the neighborhood thrown into a panic. It was the first time a shell fell into this part of the city, although Chinese air bombs fell nearby Aug. 14, killing more than 47 persons. Trouble loomed for Tsingtao on the Shantung coast, where hundreds of foreigners spent the summer and scores of missionaries from the interior of the province are concentrated. Japanese sources said 6,000 Japanese women and children were taken out of Tsingtao and nearby towns. Chinese forces were digging in along a line drawn around the city, establishing heavy gun positions. Within the last 48 hours the Japanese, according to independent reports, increased their naval concentration in the Shanghai war zone to 82 warships, while transports carrying 30,000 troops are believed lying off the mouth of the Yangtze. A Japanese airbase said fortifications are said to have been established on Tsungshing Island, at the Yangtze's mouth. The Japanese claimed they killed 350 Chinese soldiers and captured four tanks in Yangtzeport, while the Chinese asserted they pushed back the Japanese lines and killed many enemy marines. The Eastern district—including Yangtzeport and Hongkew—was the scene of a unique "jail break," as 1,000 convicts, including murderers, narcotics addicts and other felons were set free. Most were Chinese, but there were several Russians. They were the first group freed from the huge Ward Road jail, because the international Shanghai municipal council considered the prison untenable because of the war swirling around it. The prison held 7,000, some serving life terms. This correspondent witnessed the emergence of the first 1,000. Some seemed stunned by their liberty, which thrust them into a world of war. All looked frightened and dazed. In the open street they changed from striped prison garb to ordinary Chinese clothes. Each was handed a rice cake and then they were herded in motor trucks through the international settlement to its western boundary where they were thrust into Chinese territory to meet

Old-timer Passes On

By Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, Aug. 22 — George Wright, known nationally as "the grand old man" of baseball, died last night at the age of 90, severing one of the remaining links with the era of razorlike spikes, glovecatchers, and handiebar moustaches. Wright, captain of the first professional baseball club—Cincinnati Red Stockings of 1869—succumbed after a long illness. Founder of the Boston National League club in 1871 and always mentioned among the greatest players, Wright attended major league games as often as he could in his later years. Debt Moratorium Authorized in Alta.

EDMONTON, Aug. 22—(CP)—Designed to prevent transfer of money from Alberta, the second debt moratorium in the province this year was ready tonight for final approval by the government. An order-in-council authorizing the moratorium, which primarily would concern such as banks, mortgage and insurance companies, has been prepared and will be passed by the cabinet tomorrow. Premier Aberhart announced Saturday. To be effective for a period of six months, the moratorium could be extended if necessary. "This moratorium has been forced on us by Ottawa's drastic action on behalf of the Bank of Canada and the chartered banks," the Premier said. "Our aim is to prevent money being collected to be sent out of the province." Unlike the debt moratorium in effect from Feb. 22 to July 1, the new suspension of collections will not apply to private individuals who would continue under the Debt Adjustment Act, broadened at the June session of the legislature to include all resident debtors instead of only farmers and home owners.

An international inspection party of airfields around Nanking found Japanese claims of heavy destruction to be false. At the base near the Ming Tombs on the outskirts of Nanking they found a machine shop had been destroyed and one plane under repair. Wrecked. At another field one training plane was found destroyed. Foreign military observers today said the battle for Shanghai, despite the ferocity with which it is being waged, will have little effect on the Japanese in the widespread fighting unless it results in engaging large Japanese forces and relieving Japanese pressure on the northern front. Chinese readers expressed belief the Shanghai battle would prove to be a mere episode in a conflict expected to last for months, perhaps years, and said that Chinese plans were being formulated on that basis.

(Continued from page 1) help. I can't understand why they should have done it. It seems to me the whole thing is just some silly prank. My husband had no enemies I know of, and I can't think of any motive for it at all." The wife of Mr. G. Forster of Cowansville gave chase immediately but the fleeing car outdistanced him. He raced back to town and telephoned the customs and police officers at Richmond, Vt., on the border 20 miles away. Forster said all the men in the cars were released after questioning at the border. Most of them, he said, were Cowansville residents and they were allowed to return home. Numbers of men in the machines varied, according to reports, from a dozen to 25. No one at the golf club realized Griss was being kidnapped until after he had been shoved into one of the waiting machines. There were about 30 on the course, said Forster who could give no reason for the abduction. Forster said he was not aware that United States immigration authorities were reported holding five men. Immigration officers said over the telephone they were holding five men, but they would not discuss the abduction nor would they reveal the whereabouts of Griss. The Cowansville chief said he expected there would be further questioning of the men tomorrow. The minister was contemplating the new baby. ST. JAMES CHURCH. At the morning service yesterday the Rev. Dr. Legate made reference to the gift of a "pail" for the pulpit, presented by Mrs. Charles Hyndman, one of the oldest and most esteemed members of the congregation. This gift is a piece of handsome embroidery bearing as a design the Celtic cross which, Dr. Legate pointed out, was so closely associated with the work of Saint Columba of Iona, who was the pioneer missionary to the Highland and Islands of Scotland, and which, as an ornament, is widely used in the Church of Scotland today. The sermon preached by the Minister, "Possessing Our Possessions," was taken from Obadiah 17—The house of Jacob shall possess their possessions." Dr. Legate in giving the background for his sermon pointed out that Obadiah's is the shortest book in the Old Testament, but like some men who are sparing of their words what he does say is very much to the point and scattered through his twenty-one verses there are utterances which are provocative of thought and calculated to be of very considerable help to the careful reader. In making the allusion "the house of Jacob shall possess their possessions" Obadiah was referring to a certain section of land, rightfully owned by Israel, but at the time overrun by the Edomites. The Minister drew a distinct comparison between what a person owned and what he possessed. He showed that while a person may be the owner of a large library, unless he had read and studied the books he did not really possess them. The same applied to our spiritual possessions, the Gospel, Prayer, and the Bible. Dr. Legate said there are Edomites who have been hindering us from entering into and enjoying these great spiritual possessions and urged his hearers to go against these encroaching enemies and really and truly "possess our possessions". During the offertory, Mrs. J. A. Lawson sang "Consider the Lilies".

Middle Of October Said Likely Date For Election

OTTAWA, Aug. 22—(CP)—Alberta and Ontario will vie with each other for the political spotlight this week while at Ottawa another area of quiet is anticipated. Last week Prime Minister Mackenzie King and his colleagues in the Dominion Government made history when they disallowed three acts of Alberta's Social Credit Government designed to take over control of banking within the province. Premier William Aberhart announced his intention of calling another special session of the legislature to meet this situation, but has not yet fixed the date. In Ontario the provincial general election campaign is practically in full swing but Premier Mitchell Hepburn has so far failed to divulge the polling date. He may make the announcement this week and the middle of October is said to be the likely time. "The Government's Royal Commission to investigate all phases of economic and constitutional relations between the provinces and
