—TOXOID CLINICS—Miss Zinck, Prince County Red Cross Nurse, will be at Malpeque School on Friday morning, when, in conjunction with the local doctor, the first treatment of toxoid for the immunization of children from diphtheria will be administered by them to the children of the district, which includes Malpeque, Darnley, Baltic and Spring Valley. Parents who wish their children, under school age, to be treated, should take them to the Malpeque School that morning. On the same afternoon, Miss Zinck will be at Kensington, where the children from Margate, Clinton, Indian River and Kelvin Grove will be given the treatment. On Monday afternoon, the Red Cross Nurse will be at Bedeque School for the administration of the toxoid to the children of the Bedeque district, which includes North Bedeque, Central Bedeque, Lower Bedeque and Fernwood. The parents of children attending the Middleton School, may bring them to Bedeque School to receive their treatment if they so desire. Miss Zinck is conducting a home nursing and hygiene class for the Junior Red Cross members of the Bedeque Schools in the Bedeque School every morning. It is encouraging to see the interest taken by the pupils in this work.—S.
