THE TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

We are glad to see that the Maritime Board of Trade at its meeting next month, among other important matters is expected to take up the question of an improved telegraph service between this Island and the Mainland. We are sorry, however, that it should be found necessary at this late date to make any further representations in regard to a matter which has been before the public for years.  
It is and has been notorious that our half-time, double-price telegraph service is altogether behind the age and discreditable to a civilized and progressive country such as Canada claims to be. The remedy ought to have been found long ago, but it looks now that the session of parliament will close without anything being done to improve it. We believe that Sir Louis Davies is sincerely desirous to obtain fair play and even-handed justice for the people of his native city and Island in this as in other matters. He has had this year, in addition to the great cares and labors of his department the heavy work of attending the High Commission and a very long session of Parliament. He has done much for us in other ways but we must record our deep regret, that after waiting long and patiently we find our telegraph grievance just as it was years ago. By all means let the Maritime Board of Trade take up the question again. Agitation and publicity, if persistent in so good a cause, must in the end prevail.

Ottawa has made its first experiment with Sunday cars. The receipts for the day were \$892, against \$1057 on the previous Saturday. Down to noon on Sunday but \$32 was taken, showing that the cars were very little used by persons going to church. Nearly all the passengers were those going to and returning from the parks. The Free Press tells that the result was very disappointing to the street railway company.

Canadian trade is now \$56 per head of the population, against \$24 per head in the United States. The New York Post remarks upon this, together with the fact that our trade has increased by \$60,000,000 within the past two years and concludes that the Dingley tariff is not likely to "bring the Canadians to their knees". On the contrary the Post says it has placed us in a position "to be stiffer and haughtier than ever before."

Since the shipping season opened over 50 cattle have been seized in Montreal on account of being diseased with tuberculosis or lump-jaw, mainly the latter. Others have been shipped back from Portland to their original shipping points in Ontario. In the west the consumers are not content to assume that all the meat offered for sale is healthful. Here we are more confiding. What has become of the lump jaw bees that were being fattened about the Island a month or two ago?

An Italian Professor, Lombroso by name, who is honored as a man of science in his own country and writes for the English reviews, has an article in The Forum in which he argues that Christopher Columbus was a 'degenerate.' According to Lombroso Columbus' father was a meddlesome busy-body, not quite honest in his dealings, and the son resembled the father. Christopher had an aquiline nose, arched eyebrows, grew grey early in life, wrote a flourishing hand, and

was inordinately conceited. He was very ignorant, cruel, and an atrocious liar, lying about his voyages in the crudest fashion. From these alleged facts Lombroso argues that Columbus was a "degenerate". A more general opinion will be that Lombroso is willing to attain notoriety by slandering the great discoverer.

**The World's Meet.**

MONTREAL July 26.—The list of entries for the World's Bicycle Meet is already filling up fast.  
Mr. David J. Watson, the English secretary, is in receipt of a considerable number of letters asking for information regarding accommodation, and the entries are coming in very fast. Yesterday he received word from Nat and Tom Butler, the American flyers, that they wanted to enter for the professional events. Frank Starbuck, a noted professional rider, will also be here, and many of America's best amateurs are expected, so that there will be riders in plenty. The good ship Vancouver is now well on her way across the ocean bringing a batch of English and Scotch riders, and probably German and French ones, too, as it is not definitely known who is really on the steamer.  
The prize committee has reported the work accomplished to date. Chairman Manhire has got a committee of hard workers and from the list of prizes already received the collection will beat anything that has ever been presented to the racing men. Among some of the prizes is a new Morris upright piano, valued at \$350, donated as first prize for the 15-mile road race. The piano has been donated through Mr. W. H. Leach, agent for the Morris Company. The Dunlop Tire Company have also donated a handsome trophy for the first Canadian team winning the race. The members of the prize committee are busily engaged in securing prizes from the business firms of the city and the merchants will confer a great favor by receiving any member of this committee in as practicable way as possible. They are Charles Manhire, chairman; L. E. Morin, jr., of Potter & Morin; W. A. Corcoran, with Simpson, Hall & Miller. The work of this committee is very hard, and consequently the support of all interested in the success of the meet should be given freely.

**COUNCIL OF TRADE**

Held a Meeting Yesterday Afternoon.

**THE LIST OF SUBJECTS To Be Brought Before the Maritime Board at Next Month's Meeting.**

There was held a meeting of the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade yesterday afternoon. The President read some important communications in reference to the direct steamship service with Great Britain.  
Several delegates were also appointed to attend the regular Annual Meeting of the Maritime Board to be held in St. John, N. B. on the 16th of August. The following is a partial list of the subjects which are then to come up for consideration.  
The development of iron and steel industries.  
Statutory conditions for fire insurance policies.  
The proposed increase in Marine Insurance rates in connection with Canadian ports on the Atlantic coast.  
Municipal Taxation in the Maritime Provinces.  
Tourist Travel and the development of accommodation for summer visitors and their attraction to points of interest.  
Encouragement of trade relations between Canada and the West Indies.  
Improved telegraphic communication between P. E. I. and the Mainland.
