Germans Seize Vimy Ridge Undergoes Many Changes

QUEBEC, Oct. 21.—That surprising changes have taken place in the vicinity of Vimy Ridge and other parts of the French and Belgian battlefields since the termination of the war, changes that would astonish those Canadian soldiers who have not had a chance to revisit scenes of the conflict, was the gist of a statement today by Brig. General T. H. Hughes, C. M. G., chief engineer of the Canadian Battlefield Memorial Commission, who returned to Canada to make an official report to headquarters at Ottawa.

General Hughes said that five important contracts were nearing completion. Those included a road across Hill 145, Vimy Ridge. The other developments were memorial parks at St. Julien, Bourlon Woods, Courcellette and La Quesnel, as well as other minor work.

"In building the road across Vimy Ridge," he said, "we unearthed a German tunnel which had never been discovered. We also came across other evidence of German work during the time they occupied this section of the ridge."

It was learned that the principal work next year will be at Vimy Ridge, where a suitable memorial will be erected. This is now being designed in London.

HAMILTON, Ont., Oct. 21.—Dr. Charles Stewart has "exercised a woman's privilege" and changed his mind. Officials of the Hamilton Ontario Hockey Association senior club stated today that their star goalkeeper would not play professional hockey this year, despite the fact that he had signed a contract with the Boston pro club yesterday.

Stewart tore up his contract this morning. His explanation of this unusual happening is that when he signed the contract, Art Ross, representative of the Boston club, gave him the right to call all negotiations off in the event of parental objection to him making the jump. Today Stewart learned that his father was very much opposed to him playing as a professional.

The decision to remain an amateur means that Carson Cooper will also refuse to play professional.

THE IDEA OF THE BALLOON

The first practical idea of the balloon originated in the latter half of the eighteenth century, when the Montgolfier brothers, noting how smoke rose upward into the air, conceived the idea of filling a bag with smoke. The development of this idea resulted in the construction of the first hot air balloon in June, 1783. This consisted of a spherical cloth bag about thirty-five feet in diameter and inflated over a fire fed with bundles of chopped straw. The next step was the use of hydrogen gas, and the balloon was practically invented as used today. The use of this gas was the idea of M. Charles, a professor of natural philosophy at Paris.
