"HART SPECIAL"

A Brief Review of the History of Co. MR. WILLIAM MORAN Controls the Sale of Hartt Special for the City of Charlottetown.

In the summer of 1893, Mr. O. M. Hartt, a gentleman who had a long experience in shoemaking in the New England States went to Fredericton, New Brunswick, with his family for rest and vacation. Mr. Hartt had not been there long before he became convinced that there was an opportunity for a paying investment in the establishment of a modern shoe factory at the capital of New Brunswick, down among the "rags and tatters" of confederation. He soon succeeded in interesting some gentlemen of Fredericton in this project, with the result that he was induced to remain and promote a company for the purpose of manufacturing fine shoes for Canada. This succeeded so well that on the 23rd November, 1893 "The Hartt Boot & Shoe Company, (Limited), received a charter of incorporation from the Province of New Brunswick, authorizing a capital of \$100,000. Mr. R. L. Savage was engaged as manager for the company. His ability to conduct the company's affairs has more than justified his selection. By his advice it was decided to establish the most modern up-to-date factory possible for the making of fine boots and shoes, and in the spring of 1899, while the factory was under construction, Mr. Savage carried on for the company, a jobbing trade in the Maritime Provinces which served as an introduction for his company to the trade. The building was begun the latter part of April and completed and fully equipped, so that on the afternoon of August 15th, 1899, the first pair of shoes came through. The plant was all carefully selected in the United States, and comprises outfits for the manufacture of Goodyear welts, McKay flexible, standard screwed and turn work. The lasts were selected from the best of those in use by the largest manufacturers in the United States, and the patterns and designs all specially made for the Company. Prominent among these and worthy of special mention is the "Eli back-stay," introduced by the company in Canada. The merit of this device is that the boot cannot rip in the back, and for hockey, skating and cycling has no equal. It is also a very easy walker and bids for quick popularity. Besides their general lines of fine grade shoes, the company also make "Hartt Specials" a high grade Goodyear welted shoe for men and women. It is also a fact that this Company operates the only Goodyear plant in the Maritime Provinces. As above intimated the first shoe made by this company was finished on August 15th, 1899. Samples for the spring of 1899 were by this time in course of manufacture. These were made by expert American shoe makers, and in September following four travellers were sent out, three in the Maritime Provinces and one to Manitoba and British Columbia. The lines of samples which these gentlemen carried excited, first, the curiosity and subsequently the jealousy of their rivals. It was conceded that these goods were in advance of the Canadian trade, but could these goods have been made away down in the Maritime Provinces where the art and science of fine shoemaking had been at that time comparatively unknown? Some imaginative mind solved this mystery by telling

INCREASED AWARDS FOR LAND DAMAGES

Judgments of the Exchequers Court at Ottawa Yesterday

CLAIMANTS ON THE MURRAY HARBOR RAILWAY

The Amounts Awarded by the Arbitrators and Refused by the claimants in Eight Cases Handsomely Enlarged—with Costs and Interest—Mr. F. Boyver Given a Crossing, Interest and Cost—The Counsel For the Parties.

OTTAWA, June 13.—(Special)—In the Exchequer Court to-day judgments were delivered in the following cases relating to the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway and which were tried at Charlottetown before Judge Burbridge in April last.

FRANKLIN BOYVER, \$2,650.
The King v. Franklin Boyver.—Judgment for the defendant for \$2,650 and a crossing. This was the amount offered by the Government but refused by the defendant, but no crossing was reserved to him. He now gets a crossing besides interest. The Crown pays the costs.
Peters for the Crown; Haszard, K. C. for defendant.

NICHOLAS J. JENKINS, \$350.
The King v. Nicholas J. Jenkins.—Judgment for the defendant for \$350 and interest since date of expropriation and costs. The amount offered by the Government was \$300. The judgement increases this by \$50.
Palmer K. C. for the Crown; Stewart K. C. for defendant.

W. DUFFY, \$900.
The King v. W. Duffy.—Judgment for defendant for \$900, an increase of \$100 over the amount awarded by the Arbitrators. Interest and costs are allowed the defendant.
Peters A. G. for the Crown; Stewart K. C. for defendant.

PATRICK DUFFY, \$600.
The King v. Patrick Duffy.—Judgment for the defendant for \$600 besides interest and costs, an increase of \$225 over

another that the Hartt samples had been made in Lynn. The story spread from Sydney to Vancouver, with the result that this new competitor received the very best possible introduction to the trade of Canada through the rivalry of jealousy of competition. Nevertheless they sold, and in the following February and March the Company was shipping goods to all the Maritime cities and towns and to points from Winnipeg to Dawson City. The manner in which the trade received its goods induced the Company to enlarge its capacity in order to make a bid for trade in Quebec and Ontario, and during the season just closed a satisfactory business has been established in these provinces. Mr. Savage, the manager, puts his whole energy into the business, and Mr. McCready, who is also Secretary of the Company, is a barrister of Fredericton. It was mainly through the enterprise of these gentlemen that this company was established and has won for himself such an enviable place among the shoe manufacturers of Canada. "Hartt Special" boots for men are sold by W. Moran, Sunnyside; who has control of those boots for the City.
