National Boxing Ass'n Issues Quarterly Lineup

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—The National Boxing Association tonight issued its quarterly score card on the toughness of the boys in the sock-em profession and put pressure on all the top rankers to prove their right to the championship rating.

Abe J. Green, N.B.A. president, seeking to cut a pattern for other sports in the expected post-war boom, called on all champions to sign by April 1 for title defence matches to be held by June 1.

The Joe Louis-Billy Conn heavyweight title bout would be an exception since they have signed to fight in June.

Green suggested that interest in boxing would be stimulated if when five Russian masters failed to appear.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Jan. 11 (AP)—Hugh Mulcahy of the Phillies says every major leaguer leaving the army needs at least a month's extra spring workout—so he is practicing what he is preaching.

Mulcahy, first big time star to feel the touch of the draft, was discharged from the United States Army last fall after serving more than four years and working his way up to master sergeant. This week he started conditioning himself for the opening of Philadelphia's Phillie Phanatic in Miami Beach next month.

Sport Shorts From Britain

LONDON, Jan. 8 (AP)—Henry Cotton, world's professional golf champion, has few ideas which (he hopes) will make the game as big a spectacle as other sports.

He was ready with an answer when sceptics wondered how it will be financed, in addition to thousands of the \$500 (\$2,500) prize money in the British open at St. Andrews next July.

"It's perfectly simple," said Cotton. "Every effort is being made to save from the fate of the passenger pigeon, and hunters of the lonely islanders are earnestly implored to spare them."

A Christmas Rose (Helleborus niger) sent from Vancouver to a Toronto friend some years ago, is blooming amid the snow on Jan. 14, 1946, when the Big Blizzard struck Ontario, it actually bloomed beneath the snow for some days in a frost and lovely as ever when rescued from its white tomb.

A member of the Buttercup family with tulip-like flowers, a greenish-white tipped with mauve, it has thick, velvety leaves of dark green spreading low over the ground. The plant which is dormant more or less all spring and summer, has its blooms its prettiest at Christmas. In Ontario gardens it has withstood temperatures as low as 10 above zero without appreciable hurt.

In New York City a troop of Boy Scouts supply a Christmas stocking for the birds every year. It is a huge affair made of wire mesh and they cram it to the bursting point with cracked corn, bread, suet, peanuts and other goodies. It is then deposited near one of the trees in Central Park, Canada geese, wood ducks, black ducks and mallards are always among the grateful guests at the Yuletide feast. It is an idea worth copying in Canada.

TORONTO, Jan. 13 (CP)—Golden eagles, once frequent visitors in the winter season at Algonquin Provincial Park, Ontario, are now scarce, but a few have been seen in the area.

One specimen was found, still alive, by Ranger Joe Leavelle while making a check on the wolf packs. It made a complete recovery and was sent to Riverdale Zoo, Toronto.

Now that the use of wolf pelts has been discontinued, it is hoped that the eagles will be seen more frequently soaring above the park. Bald eagles may be found, though rarely, at any season except the dead of winter. While no nests of this species have been found, it is probable that they exist in the shooting and bad eagle that makes the osprey or fish-hawk drop its fish by intimidation and fear, in a "power drive" of incredible swiftness, grabs the fish before it strikes the water.

Mess Room Chatter

WITH THE R.C.A.F. OVERSEAS, Jan. 8 (CP)—A group of British pilots, some of whom had met at the White Hart Hotel, Braemar, Scot., for an unveiling ceremony. There they had written their signatures on a board in the bar, a favorite off-duty rendezvous when they were flying from Bletchley Hill, Kenley stations.

Names which later became household words—such as Canada's "Bomber" Bevington among them—have been preserved on the board.
