Livestock

MONTREAL, June 11-(CP)- There were only 17 sheep and lambs, 288 hogs, and 255 calves for sale on Montreal livestock markets. Calves were steady to 25 cents lower. Other kinds of livestock were firm.

Veal calves ranged from \$8 to \$10. Good veals were \$10 to \$10.50 on the bulk of fair to medium kinds in mixed lots around \$9. Drinkers ranged from \$6.50 to \$7.50 mostly \$6.50 to \$7.

Good lambs were \$12.50 to \$13 per cwt. Commoner kinds \$10 to \$11. Sheep \$5 to \$5.50.

The bulk of the hogs were sold on a rail grade basis at \$13.75 for B-1 dressed, \$10.25 to \$10.50 for B-1 alive fed and watered, and up to \$10.75 off trucks delivered. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$6 to \$8.50 live weight.

At Moncton, rail grade hogs \$13.20, contract deliveries \$13.40. Rail grade sows number one over \$70 pounds \$11, number one over 270 pounds \$10.00, number two all weights \$9.

Choice steers \$9.50, good \$8.25, medium \$7.25, fair \$6.25, common \$5. Choice heifers \$8.50, good \$7.75, medium \$6.75, fair \$5.75, common \$5. Good cows \$7, medium \$5.25, fair \$5.50. Canners \$4, cutters \$4.50, \$7.25.

Veals \$7.50, grassers \$4.50. Rail grade lambs 26 cents.

Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, June 11-(CP)- Stocks continued on the upward slant in today's operations on the Toronto exchange. Volume was better than the recent average at 147,000 shares.

Smelters firmed 3-4 to 32 3-4. Hudson Bay firmed a full point to 24 7-8 and Nickel added 1-4 while Norlat, Sherrill and Ventures posted minor gains. Steep Rock finished narrowly lower at 102.

Kerr-Addison and Paymaster were gold group leaders, the former adding 10 cents to close at 4.45, a new high and Paymaster gaining 1 1-4 to close at 17 1-2 on turnover of 34,500 shares. Coniarum advanced 15 cents to 128 and gains of 5 to 6 cents were netted by Perron, East Malartic, Pioneer and San Antonio and 3 cents gains appeared for Auror, God's Lake, Jason, O'Brien and Senator. Preston was active and steady and Central Pacific, Macassa, Pickle Crow and Pamour weakened slightly.

Both Abitibi issues advanced and Great Lakes Paper pfd firmed 1 1-2 to 13 1-2. Gains of a point or more came through for Branifford Cordage, Canadian Dredge, International Milling pfd and Fanny Farmer.

Home Oil, Brown, Extension and Pacala firmed narrowly and minor losses were netted by Calgary and Edmonton and Highwood.

Montreal Exchange

MONTREAL, June 11-(CP)- Issues were fairly steady in trading on the stock exchange today. The range was comparatively broad. St. Lawrence Corporation "A" headed upward, in papers, and St. Lawrence Paper also showed a small gain. Price Brothers moved back slightly. In mines, Hudson Bay Mining won an advance of 1 1-2 but Hollinger was fractionally softer.

Utilities were featured by the weakness of Montreal Power and Quebec Power, both of which were in new low territory. Brazilian, in the face of some buying interest, edged forward the minimum fraction.

Industrials and miscellaneous stocks were inclined to slip. General Steel Wares showed a minus, as did Ogilvie preferred and Good-year preferred. Bruck Silk moved up a fraction.

NEW YORK, June 11-(AP)- The stock market today extended the rising movement which began June 2, showing stubbornly higher through repeated selling resistance.

Only three issues showed any changes among Canadian stocks, International Nickel and Brazilian Traction each advancing 1-8 of a point and Dome 1-4.

The Associated Press average of 60 selected stocks went up 1/4 of a point at 41.5. Transactions totaled 538,300 shares compared with 255,780 yesterday when the average jumped 6 of a point.

Ahead at the last were Bethlehem, Republic Chrysler, Cabotlar, North American Aviation, Western Union, American Smelting, Dow Chemical, Du Pont, Owens-Illinois, American Car and Foundry, Texas Corp. and Loft, which set a new 1941 high.

Jones & Laughlin pfd. off 2 points at one time, made a strong comeback to close only 1-8 point down. The action followed announcements of the steel firm's financing plan. Others ending lower included General Motors, Southern Railway Allied Chemical, Johns-Manville and American Telephone.

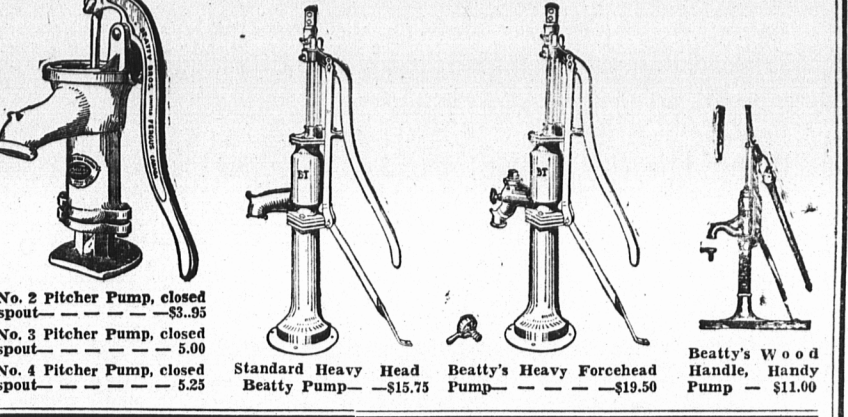
MRS. ANNIE SHAW

NEW YORK, June 11-(CP)- For the third day in a row the pound sterling and the Canadian dollar closed unchanged in relation to the United States dollar in foreign exchange dealings today. Sterling was quoted at \$4.03 1-2 and the Canadian currency at a discount of 1 7-8 per cent. (Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09-9.91 per cent discount.) The Argentine free peso closed .05 cent higher at 23.70 cents. Other major foreign currencies were unchanged.

500 R. A. F. Cadets

Start training in U.S.

WASHINGTON, June 10-(CP)- Five hundred Royal Air Force cadets started training in United States flying schools yesterday as the first class in a scheme that will graduate between 6,000 and 7,000 pilots a year.

With the Commonwealth Training plan in operation in Canada, it will mean that eventually all cadets for the R. A. F. and its affiliations, such as the Royal Canadian Air Force will be completed on this side of the Atlantic.
