Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may not establish a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C. M. WORK AT BORDEN

Some fifty German prisoners, who were brought to the Island from the Amherst interment camp, have been engaged for the past week on the Borden branch of the P. E. Island Railway, ditching, cleaning up the road, repairing fences and doing various other jobs required on the line. They are guarded by 27 men during the day and a smaller number at night. They are credited with twenty cents per hour by the Militia Department and after the railway takes an amount off for their food and upkeep the balance is handed over to the Militia Department. The prisoners are supposed to pay for their own clothing and do their own laundry work. The Borden branch is now ballasted from end to end, new standard ties have been laid and the branch from end to end is being put in shape for laying of the new rails in Sept. It will be a simple matter once the rails are laid on the standard sleepers to shift them for the wide gauge. A great deal of work has been done at Borden and is still progressing. The yard has been ballasted with material taken from New Brunswick and the construction of a coal trestle is in full swing. There is a "fill in" of 9,000 yards which is being completed by the Railway whilst a firm in New Brunswick is building the trestle. When the work is done, the Mainland cars will be elevated to a height of forty feet above the narrow gauge cars which are to receive the coal. The railway has forty-five men at work at Borden, with fifty Germans about a mile out and the contractors of the coal trestle have about thirty.

There are two contracts going on, the building of a concrete sea wall along the pier and a new fender at the ship's berth, Mr. Peter Clark, of Summerside, having the latter contract. The Car ferry steamer is expected to come off the slip at Halifax this week and when back on the route will make her regular double trips daily. The Northumberland is working seven days a week to keep the freight clear, and made a trip yesterday, Sunday. Some fifty cars of freight are still on the other side. The perishable freight is always given the preference and the aim is to give every shipper and consignee his turn. The Scotia brought over a cargo of rails on Saturday.



REICHSTAG WILL ASK FOR \$375,000,000

 AMSTERDAM, August 4.—It is reported that the Reichstag will be asked to pass another war credit bill this summer amounting to \$375,000,000. If this is passed it will raise Germany's war debt close to \$35,000,000,000.

GERMANS CAUGHT IN THEIR PYJAMAS

 LONDON, August 4.—In a recent Italian advance in Albania, according to reports received here, a German general and several other German officers were made prisoners dressed in pink pyjamas, so completely were they surprised. The same source confirms reports of the excellent work of British monitors. They shelled most effectively the retreating Austrians near the coast.

M.S.A. DESERTERS GIVEN TILL AUG. 24

If They Voluntarily Report for Duty Before That Date are Exempted from Liability to Punishment.

GERMANS IN RUSSIA

 OTTAWA, Aug. 4.—An extra of the Canada Gazette issued Saturday evening contains a proclamation removing deserters and absentees under the Military Service Act from liability to punishment if they report for duty between now and August 24th. It is recognized that any men who failed to report because of lack of a proper understanding of the Act will be glad and willing to do so if a period of grace is allowed. It is believed that the establishment of such a period will bring to the colors many men whom it would be difficult otherwise to reach.

TERRORIST CAMPAIGN AGAINST GERMANS IN RUSSIA

 LONDON, August 4.—The terrorist campaign against the Germans of the Russian social revolutionists of the left includes an explosion at Kiev, which resulted in the deaths of 100 German soldiers in addition to the murder of Field Marshal von Eichorn. The Copenhagen correspondent of the Daily Mail quotes a leading member of the party as authority.

MAXIM GORKY TO BE "INVESTIGATED"

 LONDON, August 4.—The arrest of Maxim Gorky, the Russian author and revolutionary, has been ordered to an investigating commission of the Soviet government, says an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Copenhagen. The Petrograd correspondent of the Daily Express reports that the Gorky paper has been suppressed.

HOOVER HAD CLOSE CALL

 PARIS, August 4.—It was reported here today that Herbert Hoover, American Food Administrator, and his party, had a narrow escape in a German air raid on Boulogne, when a bomb blew in the windows of their private car.

6,000 BACHELORS PAID HEAD TAX

(Special to The Guardian)
 MONTREAL, August 4.—Six thousand bachelors had registered in the city up to today as an outward sign of their willingness to pay, however grudgingly, a special tax of \$10 a year which the city authorities have decided to levy upon all unmarried men 25 years of age and over towards meeting the increasing cost of Montreal's administration.

UNION JACK IN HUN LINES

In the recent raid at Neuville Vitasse four Canadian soldiers were specially deputed to nail a Union Jack with a letter attached to the remnants of the spire of a church in the German lines. They did their task thoroughly and got back uninjured. The Germans were unable to get the Union Jack down until the following evening. The letter told the German officers in the front-line terms what the Canadians thought of them for keeping in the background while the rank and file went in the front fighting. The brother of Sergeant Samson, the Canadian crucified after the capture by the Germans in the second battle of Ypres is a sergeant-major in the Newfoundland forces. He won the D. C. M. some time ago for exceptional courage. His comrades say that he has amply avenged his brother's death by the many scores of Germans he has killed.—London Ex.
