War Garden Bulletin

Practical Daily Guide for Vacant Lot and Backyard Gardeners Enlisted in Greater Production Campaign

Issued by the Canada Food Board in collaboration with experts on the staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm

THE POTATO PATCH

Every prospective gardener must concentrate on potatoes this year. The most suitable soil for the tubers is a rich, deep, friable, warm, sandy loam with good natural drainage, a constant moderate supply of moisture and an adequate supply of decayed or decaying vegetable matter. The warmest and best drained soils that can be obtained should be chosen for the early potatoes, and the sets should be planted shallow, so that they will get the advantage of the heat from the surface soil.

May 18th is time enough to plant your potatoes, but in the meantime be preparing your soil. Get it as mellow as possible. While forking it over add some stable manure. To obtain enough food to produce twenty or thirty bushels of tubers a small patch of ground must take up and evaporate through the leaves tons and tons of water. This water holds the plant food in solution. Your soil does not hold water and it should be your task to make it do this. The more like a sponge you can make it the better, providing the water in it does not become stagnant. If you add plant food to a physically fit or sponge-like soil, good growth is bound to result. The quality of stable manure is that it makes the soil physically fit and supplies some food at the same time.

WAR GARDEN OFFICIAL NOW TOURING CANADA TO AID IN HOME FOOD PRODUCTION WORK

OTTAWA, May 9.—Another proof of the way in which the United States and Canada are joining hands in war work, is evidenced by the fact that H. D. Hemenway, representative of the National War Garden Commission of Washington, D. C., is now making a tour of the Dominion in the interest of the home food production campaign. The phenomenal success which this back yard and vacant lot gardening has met in the United States has led to many inquiries from boards of trade, business concerns and other organizations throughout Canada. Numerous requests for copies of the garden primers, canning and drying booklets and other literature, which the Commission received from various parts of the Dominion showed the immense interest in this method of adding to the available food supplies.

Members of the National War Garden Commission are Charles Lathrop Park of Lakewood, N. J., also president of the American Forestry Association; Luther Burbank, the world-renowned horticulturist; P. P. Claxton, U. S. Commissioner of Education; Dr. Charles W. Elliot of Cambridge, Mass.; Dr. Irving Fisher of Yale University; Fred H. Gottlinger, Cleveland, Ohio; John Hays Hammond, famous mining engineer; Fairfax Harrison, president Southern Railway; Hon. Myron T. Herrick, former American ambassador to France; Dr. John Grier Hibben, president Princeton University; Emerson McMillan, banker, New York; Mrs. John Dickinson Sherman, chairman, conservation department, General Federation of Women's Clubs; A. W. Shaw, former U. S. Forest Ranger; B. Whitely, widely known lumberman; Hon. James Wilson, former U. S. Secretary of Agriculture; and P. S. Risdale, secretary and editor "American Forestry Magazine."

help in the home food production work. "Canada will grow an immense amount of food in the back yards and vacant lots which lie idle," said Prof. Hemenway. "The United States is finding this means of increasing the nation's food supply a wonderful assistance. Estimates based on reports to the National War Garden Commission are that there are more than 5,000,000 home food producers in the United States this year who are helping to feed themselves and serve their country at the same time. "Reports show this work is being carried on extensively everywhere; and the Commission has been instrumental in getting hundreds of chambers of commerce, women's clubs, industrial companies, like the Pennsylvania Railroad, the U. S. Steel Corporation and many others, actively back of the home garden campaign. The Pennsylvania Railroad, for instance distributed more than 11,000 copies of the Commission's war garden booklets among its employees to aid them in their vegetable growing."
