The writer had the privilege of a stroll
through the large, well lighted, and
artistically decorated showrooms of this
enterprising firm, where the bewildering
array of dainty spring goods, fresh from
the world's fashion centres, the exqui-
sitely beautiful millinery, the rich
fringes, the wealth of flowers, fruit
and foliage, with festoons of flowers
everywhere the eye turns, reminds one of
a vast and beautiful conservatory. The
flowers seem so natural that one is al-
most tempted to pluck them as they pass.
Truly the decorations deserve more than
a passing mention but time is pressing,
and here our representative finds him-
self right in the midst of the artistic dis-
play of head wear and millinery novel-
ties, so dear to the feminine heart at all
seasons, but especially so at Easter.

There are hats, hats on all sides, of vari-
ous shapes and materials, and of every de-
gree of loveliness. The "Charlotte Corday"
or "mushroom" shape, the "Neapolitan,"
the "Polo" with its soft draped crown, the
Turban, Toques and Continentals are
among the most popular shapes. There is
also the large plateau which can be
shaped, by the deft milliner to suit in-
dividual styles.

There are shaded effects, and solid
colors shown in malines, ribbons, flowers
and foliage; beautiful effects are also
shown in mixed straws of every grade,
such as brown and champagne, green and
white, light and dark mauve. The flowers
shown are beautiful beyond description
from the gorgeous poppy to the modest
violet and forget-me-not, white foliage in
every shade of green to the deepest
autumnal tints are to be seen in abun-
dant.

Ribbons are being used profusely, in
every conceivable way in the millinery
creations, the new and marvellous weaves
and exquisite colorings lending interest to
their popularity. The Ombre ribbons occupy
a conspicuous place; moires are again in

GRAMOPHONE CARRIES FOR THREE MILES.

LONDON, April 12.—A gramophone that
can be heard at a distance of three miles
is the latest invention of the Hon. C. A.
Parsons, of turbine fame.

The instrument, which was exhibited
privately at Metzler's hall recently, is
named the auxetophone, and is worked
by means of compressed air. This is
pumped in by a small engine at a pressure
which can be adjusted up to over 81 lb.,
through a small valve, which takes the
place of the ordinary diaphragm, into the
trumpet. The valve consists of a number of
small slots, covered with a fine comb, not
unlike a mouth organ, and the vibration
of this comb produces the sound.

On a calm, windless day, it is estimated
that, with a high pressure, the record
could be distinctly heard three miles
away.

Another extremely fashionable hat, is in
fancy satin straw, shaded green and
white, with white tucked chiffon facing,
brim edged with the pleated, fancy
straw, chiffon rosettes on bandeau
while two white ostrich plumes sweep
backward on either side of crown and
pastel green louisine ties give a quaint
bonnet effect that is very pretty.

"Corday" hat is composed entirely of finely
shirred silk, in a beautiful shade of red,
with wreath of poppies and green foliage
on upper brim, the outer edge of which is
encircled by a wreath of velvet, geranium
leaves, shading to darkest red; a spray of
poppies underneath the brim gives the
finishing touch to a very beautiful hat.

A black hat of tuck-shirred Mechlin,
draped over a wire frame, which droops
front and back, has a ruching of straw
braided outlining brim and crown; a large
cut jet buckle ornaments the back, while
a white bird of Paradise osprey nods
gracefully from a "chou" of Mechlin on
one side. A tuck shirring of black Mechlin
faces the brim of this very stylish and
tasteful confection.

An exquisite thing in the Napoleon
shape, has the brim entirely composed of
white tuck shirred chiffon, the crown being
white horsehair braid. Sprays of green
roses are banded at the back and trail
gracefully around on either side of the
brim almost to the front.

Anything daintier in appearance cannot
well be imagined than a copper lacy
hat of straw braid and chiffon with brim
cut off close to crown in back, the ends
being caught across top of crown, and
outlined with a wreath of brown roses
with undertones of blue. A "cliche-
peigne" of ribbon shaded from brown to
blue is placed on the back to give a coquet-
ish tilt forward to the whole hat. These
are all the work of Miss Murnaghan, the
firm's capable milliner, and her clever staff
of assistants, and compare most favorably
with the imported models, a few of which
are here described.

A beauty is composed entirely of ribbon
in a lovely shade of rose, brim and crown
edged with a ruching of satin straw
in a deeper shade. A wreath of exqui-
site shaded velvet and silk
roses, with their rich foliage
trails around the upper brim, which
is faced with shirred ribbon and orna-
mented with buckles in pastel pink, set
with rhinestones, price \$10.75.

A beautiful floral hat, in the Polo shape
has the crown entirely composed of roses
and rose leaves, shading from russet
green to burnt orange, elaborate rosettes
of brown and green maline with jewelled
centres, and loops of brown and green satin
marvelous complete a hat which is a gem
of the milliner's art. Our representative
was surprised to find the price marked
only \$10.00 but the sales-lady explained
that the imported models were all priced
at selling, not fancy prices.

An exquisite creation in shir-
red champagne Liberty silk, up-
turned brim draped with cascades
of accordion-plaited chiffon; a
handsome spray of cowslips rests on the
brim to the right, while the left is elabo-
rated with puffings of ribbon, bearing
same shades as cowslips. Another spray
shading from green to brown is caught
with a pastel buckle and falls over the
hair in back. Price \$9.00. This is only a few
and gives but a slight idea of the display
as it really is.

Then there are the children's hats, also
in modifications of the Corday and Na-
poleon shapes, the quaint pokes and
ruffled effects that are sure to be
intensely becoming to the little wearers.
S. Jace forbids to give a detailed descrip-
tion, but it may be said that there is some-
thing pretty for every age from the baby
up, silk caps, lace and ribbon trimmed,
plique hats, leghorns, shaded straws with
beautiful ribbons in shot effects, button
roses, daisies and blossoms of all kinds
suitable for children's headwear.

The ready to wear hats are in abun-
dant, and show many variations in the be-
coming sailor, as well as other pretty and
practical shapes. Fancy straw medallions,
velvet bandin's and pippings are among
the trimmings used.

Not only the millinery rooms but the
entire store has a holiday appearance and
were it possible a description would be
given of the elaborate silk wafers, the
dainty white lawns, tuck and insertion
trimmed, the new dress silks in all the
fashionable shades, the dainty neckwear,
the Easter gloves, the dress goods in all
the new weaves, such as embroidered
crepe-de-chene, embroidered voiles,
Roxanas, Doekin Vicinas, silkine mohairs,
Bourette & Co. Nor must the gentlemen's
departments be passed over, which are
every day now adding to their attractions
in spring hats, overcoats, suits, ties,
collars and cuffs, gloves and all the other
little et ceteras which go to make up the
toilette of the lords of creation.


