## Final Session Of Fisheries Convention

It is the intention of the Federal Department of Fisheries to endeavour to find new markets for Canada's fish and to maintain the markets the country already has, Mr. Stewart Bates, deputy-minister of fisheries, Ottawa, told the delegates of the East Coast Fisheries conference last Thursday morning.

That session, presided over by Mr. J. B. Myrick, Tignish, concluded the three-day conference which began on April 1.

The Hon. H.P.C. Bridges, minister of fisheries, told the conference he considered the appointment of Mr. Bates as deputy-minister a wise one. It would result in greater efficiency in the department, Mr. Bridges said.

The first matter on the agenda was a discussion of source materials, with Dr. A. W. H. Needler, Director Atlantic Biological Station, St. Andrew's, N. B., and Dr. Douglas Cooper, Director of Fisheries, Province of Nova Scotia, being the principal speakers.

Dr. Needler felt that there was reason for optimism due to the long term prospects for the demand for food as pointed out by F. A. O. The Doctor felt that restriction as our stock was well under exploited. He felt that the fisheries of the east coast must be prepared to take its share of the increased production that increased population is certain to make a reality.

Dr. Cooper described the basic facts behind the use of trawlers in Canadian waters. He also dealt with the profits of by-products of fish when competition was the most severe.

The Salt Fish discussion which followed was under the chairmanship of Mr. P. M. Gibaut, of the Canadian Advisory Committee of the Salt Fish Division of the Combined Food Board.

The chairman before calling upon the discussion leaders referred to saleability of the product in one market which has quickly become flooded. The position of the salt fish industry would be stronger with more varieties saleable in all the markets of the world. Quality was essential, the speaker said and with that quality established there were many potential markets. Others participating in this topic were Mr. Fletcher Smith, Halifax, Mr. Burt McInerney, Salt Fish Administrator, Halifax, Mr. O. P. MacKenzie, Halifax who felt an International Office in London would serve no purpose, Mr. J. H. MacKinnon, Pres. Canadian Atlantic Salt Fish Exploration Association, Halifax, Mr. E. A. Boudreau, Manager Robert Jones Whiteman Company, Gaspe, and Mr. P. Boudreau Export manager of Quebec United Fishermen.

A short forum on oil, meal and moss was engaged in, Mr. A. G. Hale presiding. Leaders of the discussion were Messrs. A. Cunningham, Maurice Lessard and J. B. Myrick.

A summary of conference deliberations by Mr. Clive Planta, Secretary-Manager, Fisheries Council of Canada, Ottawa, followed.

1. Where is the office of the Public Utility Commission and Motor Carrier located and what rent is paid therefor?

2. Who are the members of these Boards and what are their salaries?

3. Is there an engineer on the Board? If so, from what College is he graduated?

4. What is the total cost to date of equipping and opening said office?

5. What clerical help is employed? Give names and salaries.

## Scores Trouble-Making Statements Of Premier In Legislative Speech



Mr. R. R. Bell

Premier Jones' threat to "outlaw" labor unions was denounced in the Legislature recently by Mr. R. R. Bell, Conservative, Second District of Queen's, as an uncalculated and mischievous statement in a Province which has never suffered from Labor troubles, and in which the closest harmony and cooperation exists between the urban and farming populations.

Speaking on the Draft Address, Mr. Bell recalled that a year ago it was mentioned in the Speech from the Throne that this Province has been fortunately free from Labor disputes. "That condition has continued," Mr. Bell said. "We have never had any trouble along that line. In Charlottetown everybody might be said to be doing the laboring classes and working for a living."

"So far as I am concerned, Labor in Charlottetown and the farmers in the country have always gone hand in hand. Farming people know that they can depend on Charlottetown to provide quite a market for their goods. We have no agitators here at all. The only agitation I saw anything about was by the leader of the Government, when he made a blast recently before the veterans of this city. I don't know what was his idea of bringing up this matter when there was no prospect of any trouble in the Province."

Found Terms Reasonable

"He talked about unions in Charlottetown. There is one Union here and they are made up of hard-working people. It was only recently that I was talking to a gentleman in this city who will have something to do with the loading of those steamers that will take our potatoes to Great Britain. He told me he had no trouble with the Union. He had a meeting with them and asked them to give him a price. They gave him a price and he was perfectly satisfied with it."

Premier Jones: "Are you aware that an agitator was in Charlottetown the other day, and according to the newspapers he said that Premier Jones will not outlaw our Union; our Union will outlaw him and place in his stead a labor and Union-minded Premier."

Mr. Bell: "Probably the only

reason he came down here was to reply to the blast you gave the Labor Union before that. Not only the Canadian Legion in Sydney have found a great deal of fault, and there was a reprimand to the local Legion that they didn't fault with you for that speech. But the point I make is, why bring this matter up here and try to make trouble? We have never had a strike here."

Premier Jones: "And there won't be any."

Mr. Bell: "The statements made were not called for and have created a great deal of trouble. It is all right to demand more than an eight-hour day, but if the Premier wants that he had better start with his own departments right here in Charlottetown. Let him take his own staff over in the liquor office. I guess they are working less than forty hours a week."

Premier Jones: "You seem to know; I have never been in it."

Mr. Bell: "What? You must know something about it, because when you addressed the veterans at their Legion dinner you told them you were giving them a bigger and better liquor store than they ever had—you had paid a Chinaman \$2,000 to get out so that you could enlarge his store for a liquor shop."

(The Premier did not reply.)

torney General in there. There was no agreement among the members of this 'happy family' on that occasion!"

"It is only two years ago since we heard the hon. member from Fourth Prince (Hon. Mr. Wright) denounce his leader in the most definite terms, right on the floor of this House." (Laughter.)

Premier Jones: "Why don't you attend the Conservative caucus?"

Mr. Bell pointed to a framed group of pictures hanging on the wall of the House, purporting to be those of members of the present Legislative Assembly. Prominent among them was the Attorney General's picture. "The Premier has not been able to get him elected to this House, yet he is represented there as a member of the House."

Premier Jones: "All those are not members."

Mr. Bell: "The Conservatives
