WORLD WOOL PRODUCTION

According to the Commonwealth Economic Committee, London world apparel wool production in 1948-49 is estimated at 298 billion pounds (greasy basis), about 2 per cent larger than in the previous season but slightly below pre-war. The present rate of production, however, does not seem to keep pace with world consumption. The International Wool Study Group reported at its recent annual meeting in London, that world stocks of wool will be reduced by the end of June, 1949, to 2.75 million pounds (greasy basis) from 3.55 million at the same date in 1948.

NEW TEACHER ADDED TO STAFF

With over forty students in Grades IX and X, it was deemed advisable to separate the two grades. CANUCK TEACHERS BY-PAS LONDON

LONDON, March 1 — (CP) — Canadian teachers are reluctant to come to London under an exchange system, London education committee said in a staff report. Only four exchanges were arranged for 1948-49 compared with 10 the previous year. "Many London teachers are ready and willing to go to Canada but the difficulty has been to find their counterparts," the report said. Hope was expressed that exchanges would be encouraged by P.H.B. Lyon, former headmaster of Rugby school who now is in Canada on behalf of the League of Empire.

Seven people, including a mother and three of her children, died in a fire which raged through a two-story tenement in Halifax, N.S. Sixteen persons survived. The tragedy so shocked eyewitnesses one of them said: "I just couldn't look any more. I had to turn my back." The fire is blamed on an oil heater that blew up in the hallway. The flaming oil, splashed over the tinder-dry woodwork of the old frame home, made the entire interior an inferno in seconds, survivors and eyewitnesses said.
