### Says Nazi Officers Tell Of Franco Aid

By RHEMBERT JAMES MOSCOW, May 17.—(AP)—Charles de Gaulle's statement that the Franco regime "under a mask of neutrality actually participated in the war on the side of Germany" were made today in a statement carried by Izvestia and attributed to two captured Nazi officers who were former military attaches in Spain.

A 10,000-word statement by the two officers declared that secret plans for military collaboration on a large scale were worked out by the Spanish and German general staffs at the close of the Spanish civil war.

The officers said that a secret plan was devised for the capture of Gibraltar through joint German-Spanish assault, that the Spaniards aided on British and American ship movements for the German navy, that they made Spain's ports and airfields available for German submarines and aircraft, and relayed to Germany valuable military information.

They said that Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel and Col-Gen. Gustav Jodl now on trial at Nuremberg on war crimes charges, took leave of Major-General Jodl, who included a secret "Isabella Felix" operation for seizing Gibraltar and widening Spanish possession in Africa and the Mediterranean, but which Hitler decided not to carry out because Hitler de-

### Tells Of Russian Espionage Efforts

By DOUGLAS HOW OTTAWA, May 18.—(CP)—Russian efforts to establish contacts at National Defence Headquarters are indicated in Russian documents injected into the espionage trial of Edward Mazerall, 30 former National Research Council engineer, by defence counsel.

In the most spectacular of the four leaves of Mazerall's trial in Ontario Supreme Court, Igor Gouzenko identified the names "Jack" and "Dick" as Russian Embassy informants although he had never developed as an agent.

Defence Headquarters later said in a statement that J. H. Jenkins, 47, O.B.E.—presumably the men meant as director of military operations and plans at defence headquarters had duties which included liaison with all accredited foreign military attaches. It was learned that he had testified before the Royal Commission on espionage and been exonerated of any complicity.

**TRANSPORT NEEDS TAKE PRIORITY**

BELGRADE, May 18.—Transportation has taken top priority along with food in UNRRA's program of rehabilitation for Yugoslavia. About two-thirds of the railroads and almost 90% of all bridges were destroyed during the war, it is estimated. There were about 2,400 locomotives in use in 1940; today there are 750 left. UNRRA is sending railroad, road and water transport equipment. Major sources are the U.S., the U.K., and purchases from U.S. military surplus.

### HOW PACIFIC COAST SALMON ARE CAUGHT



**The Troller**

Salmon trolling, in contrast with seine and gill-net fishing, employs the lure and hook principle and catches the fish individually.

Of medium size, salmon trolling boats can be recognized by the long poles extending from the sides and stern, from which lines are played out trolling spoon hooks. On the majority of boats the trolling spoons are called "wobblers" because to attract the fish they actually wobble instead of spin. When a fish strikes, the line is pulled in by a small power winch.

Smallest of all Pacific coast fishing operations, trolling nevertheless provides many thousands of fishermen with a year-round livelihood, and a part-time occupation for many more thousands living up and down the B.C. coast.

### Arterial Roads To Be Improved

LONDON, May 19.—Two schemes of long-range peacetime planning occupied the United Kingdom House of Commons at the beginning of last week, both aimed at making roads more efficient communications.

The Minister of Transport announced a ten-year programme of road building and improvement, stressed that the programme can be readily adjusted, not only to varying national and local conditions but especially to fit the overall employment picture.

Moreover, it forms the framework for town and country planning. The purposes underlying the programme are: the promotion of safety, improvements to assist areas requiring new roads, and improvement of towns and country, especially devastated areas, better access to ports and markets, improved through communication, the relief of congestion, and the reduction of traffic pollution, and efficiency of agriculture.

During the first stage, covering the next two years, it is proposed firstly to make good the repairs neglected during the war, secondly to improve particularly dangerous places, thirdly to speed up the construction of new roads, such as the unfinished tunnel under the Thames below London, the Severn estuary bridge, and the Tyne tunnel. Roads for reconstructing the damaged cities will also be started.

The second stage, lasting to the fifth year, is to include the completion of maintenance repairs, attention on major new roads, and the relief of traffic congestion. The last five years will be devoted to full reconstruction of the national routes. Some of these will be most economically constructed as new motor roads and some will be improvements of existing roads.

New roads, for example, are proposed between London and Southampton, London and Cardiff by-passing Coventry, Birmingham, Wolverhampton, Manchester and Preston, Bristol and Hull (by-passing Birmingham, Leicester, Manchester and Doncaster, Hull and Liverpool), Glasgow and Edinburgh, Glasgow, Fort William, Inverness, Stirling, Perth and Aberdeen.

It is intended to make the through-roads exclusively for motor traffic, freeing the existing main roads from much through motor traffic and making them safer and pleasanter for pedestrians, cyclists and local motor traffic.

Mr. Barnes explained that apart from the trunk roads, for which the Ministry is responsible, the initiative in highway improvements rests primarily with the local authorities together with the local preparatory work necessary to bring certain major schemes, such as the proposed new Forth Bridge, to the stage at which they could be begun. Short notice is required by employment policy. Expenditure on the first year's work is estimated at eighty-million pounds.

### People Strive To Improve Homes

LONDON.—London clutches eagerly at any sign of a return to normal and pain-pots and politeness are hailed as the latest indications that times are returning to their pre-war tempo.

More and more shopfronts are being transformed into show windows, though at present they chiefly serve to accentuate the down-at-the-heels appearance of their neighbors. Brick bomb shelters are slowly being crushed and eliminated from the rubble of homes and offices.

The campaign has its loudest champions in London Transport, which controls the city's subway and bus system. Bus conductors and drivers are exhorted to mind their P's and Q's in public, and admiring letters from passengers are given due publicity.

This love-feast reached its climax with the company announcing that regular passengers who behave nicely are to have their reward. London Transport will write them congratulatory letters.

This isn't to say that Londoners have adopted a hat-lipping, respectful attitude universally; there's still plenty of pushing in the underground and bus queues, and leather-hunged conductors still below their brusque orders.

The Times, commenting editorially on the postal system of the Nobel Islands, which classifies lying and loss of temper as punishable offences, remarked that the British citizen at the moment has many more laws to observe than at the beginning of the war, and, if added to the list police and prisons would be powerless to cope with the flood of prosecutions which would follow.

### Seeks Funds For Overseas Relief

OTTAWA, May 20.—(CP)—The Unitarian Service Committee of Canada is campaigning for funds to support its relief work in France and Czechoslovakia, including convalescent homes in both countries, a foster-parent scheme for war-shocked children and shipments of food and clothing.

The committee, with branches in Ottawa, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver, has established homes in St. Jean de Luz in France and in Olsovice, Czechoslovakia, where children of anti-Nazi patriots, regardless of creed, are given physical and mental care for a three-month period.

Canadian foster-parents who provide for a child's stay in a rest home receive the case history of the "adopted" child and his picture. They may also correspond with
