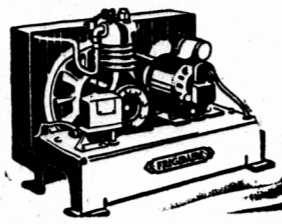


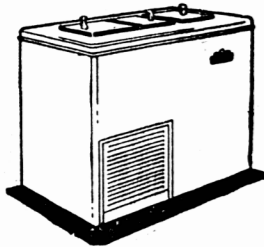
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"WHERE OLD FRIENDS MEET"

Cape Traverse Young People's Group won over Kelvin Grove Women's Institute Group 2 at Bedeque Hall, Friday night, in the first Prince County Drama Festival play-off. There was a large audience, many being unable to gain admission.

Cape Traverse in the one-act drama, "The Whirlwind", was directed by David Murphy, who also won the award as the best actor of the evening.

Miss Margaret Lord, also of the Cape Traverse group won the "best actress" prize for her interpretation of the "office nurse" in their production.

Outstanding in the Kelvin Grove presentation, "Jean Valjean and the Bishop", was Crawford Picketts in the role of "the convict", which drew praise from the adjudicator. The make-up of this group was commended. The adjudicator termed the play "a bit difficult for amateur", although it is a simpler adaptation than the royalty-play, "The Bishop and the Candlesticks."

Island Jerseys Take Top Honors

Prince Edward Island took the honours in both divisions of the three year old Jersey class, at the monthly report of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club. George MacMillan of Cornwall was represented by Hector's Lola—168742—who produced 6,061 pounds of milk, 383 lbs. of fat, with a test of 5.49%. This cow is by the well known Superior Sire, Wendybrook Hector, Carol Ann Star—170098—

was the high cow in the 305 day division with a record of 1,925 pounds of milk, 430 lbs. of fat, with a test of 5.90%, in 290 days. She is bred and owned by Davis Moore, of Summerside, P.E.I.

In the two year old class, 345 day division, Funday Stepper Sophie—168594—owned by the Funday Jersey Farm of Truro, N.S., took the lead by producing 7,443 pounds of milk, 400 lbs. of fat, with a test of 5.34%. The leader of the 305 day division, Funday Basileus Polly—176168—owned by the Funday Jersey Farm, is sired by the Superior Sire Funday Basileus, who is by the renowned Silver Medal of Merit, Superior Sire, Brampton Basileus. Polly, in 305 days, produced 5,833 pounds of milk, 337 pounds of fat, with a test of 5.79%.

Other herds represented were those of Charles J. Wavrock, of Oxford, N.S.; Kenneth W. Bullerwell, of Yarmouth; R. M. Taylor, of Bass' Corner, N.S.; and Albert E. Stetson, Freeport, P. E. I.

Only one cow was reported in the 365 day division of the mature class, and that was Blonde Fossile Queen—160778—who, at five years of age, produced 6,888 pounds of milk, 84 lbs. of fat, with a test of 5.91%, in 306 days. She is owned and tested by F. E. Weatherbee, of Westmeadows. In the 305 day division the top cow, Nappan Design's Starlight 9U—120174—produced 8,905 pounds of milk, 521 lbs. fat, with a test of 5.85%, at seven years of age. She is bred and owned by the Experimental Farm at Nappan.
