MONTREAL, Que., April 2.—The foreign demand for all lines of grain continued of a limited character here today and little business was transacted. The domestic cash grain trade was also quiet and values were irregular. A moderate trade was done in spring and winter wheat flour and the tone of the market was steady.

EGGS

OTTAWA, Ont., April 2.—Canadian egg prices are still tending lower. The Chicago market after holding fairly steady for the past week, is also lower today.

TORONTO.—Prices on this egg market are unchanged from the close of last week. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs, delivered, cases returned, extras 28-29; firsts 26-27; seconds 23-24.

MONTREAL.—There has been a further reduction in prices on this market. Ontario eggs are selling on spot today at extras 31; firsts 29; seconds 26.

4. Did the latter resign or was he dismissed?

5. Give the date of his resignation or dismissal. A bill was introduced by the Premier entitled "an act to further amend the County Courts Amendment Act of 1918." It was duly read a first time.

The annual report of the Department of Public Works for the year 1928 was tabled.

An act to further amend an act relating to the registry of deeds and lands, was read a second time, and the House dealt with it in committee of the whole.

The amendment provides that every deed purporting to be executed by the minister at the head of any department of the government of the Dominion of Canada may be registered without proof under oath or otherwise, if such deed purports to be signed by the minister and sealed with the seal of his department. The Premier explained that the purpose of the act was to facilitate the dealings, more particularly of the railway department in the purchase of land.

The bill was duly reported agreed to and ordered to be engrossed and read a third time tomorrow.

On motion of the Premier the bills embodying "an act to further amend an act to assess, levy and collect taxes on income and personal property" and "the prohibition plebiscite act," were discharged.

An act to amend an act to amend an act respecting registration of life insurance agents was next dealt with in committee of the whole. It was agreed to with amendments, ordered to be engrossed and read a third time tomorrow.

The Minister of Public Works then moved that a bill entitled "an act to amend the road act of 1928" be read a second time, and the House went into committee of the whole to consider it.

Hon. J. D. Stewart pointed out that the bill had not been tabled twenty-four hours as required by the rules.

The Minister of Public Works after some discussion moved that the bill be withdrawn from committee, and consideration deferred until tomorrow.

The bill entitled "an act for the prevention of frauds in connection with the sale of securities" was then considered in committee of the whole, and the attached schedule "A" passed. It defines the class of securities in which trust funds may be invested.

The bill was reported agreed to with amendments, ordered to be engrossed and read a third time tomorrow.

At 5.35 p. m. on motion of the Premier the House adjourned till 3 p. m. today.
