Girl Guide News



Terrariums for the Besborough Shield Contest. Judging to take place in September. I hope that you have all completed your Terrarium Cases or at least a few. Mr. Ward in 1929 accidentally discovered a new method of growing plants. One winter day he found a chrysalis of a butterfly, and anxious to preserve it, he placed it in a clump of earth in a wide-mouthed bottle which he then stopped up. Some weeks later he was surprised to find, that although his chrysalis remained the same, his butterfly contained a small, but flourishing collection of plants. He began to experiment and grew in such many plants would grow in such a humid and even atmosphere. Moisture is supplied when plants are first put in place, and gathers on the sides and top. Usually Terrariums water themselves for many weeks so watch carefully, and if water is needed, only about two tablespoonfuls. A large straight sided baking pan (inverted) may be used for the base instead of wood if you wish. One bright Guide suggested that this could be painted with the Company colors. The case after completion must be left awhile to set before planting. The most attractive plantings are of wild material, bits of moss, unusual pebbles, pretty shells (look for these on your visits to the shore), lichen-covered sticks and tiny evergreen seedlings can all be arranged to make a delightful picture. Shape a little pond without water in one corner and beg a few spent matches to make a tiny bridge to a centre piece, or this could be in the centre with the plant around it, but remember to keep it in miniature. Fill the bottom of the Terrarium with a few inches of fiber, well rotted leaf mold or garden loam mixed with sharp sand cover with plush like green moss. If moss is used, poke holes in it through which to plant whatever you have, spreading plant root as far as possible in the soil below. If you do not use moss plant as you would a pot, remember to firm the soil over the roots in both instances. Moisten the Terrarium well before planting. Do not remove the cover unless moisture forms on the glass, then just wipe off the drops and leave a little to one side for a short period. Wood violets are a good choice for planting, and small ferns, any plants with green glos-

sy leaves, dandelions, can also provide colour and be attractive. In last month's "Sign Post", instructions were given very concisely by Mrs. Margaret Wood, Refer to this for size. PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND SCALE OF AMUSEMENT TAX

Approved by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council on the 20th day of May, 1948, under authority of "The Amusement Tax Act." TO TAKE EFFECT ON MAY 24th, 1948. A Tax is payable by all persons attending a place of amusement as follows: On a price of admission of 12 cents or under, a tax of 3 cents. On a price of admission from 13 cents to 16 cents, inclusive, a tax of 4 cents. On a price of admission from 17 cents to 20 cents, inclusive, a tax of 6 cents. On a price of admission from 21 cents to 27 cents, inclusive, a tax of 8 cents. On a price of admission from 28 cents to 30 cents, inclusive, a tax of 9 cents. On a price of admission from 31 cents to 35 cents, inclusive, a tax of 10 cents. On a price of admission from 36 cents to 40 cents, inclusive, a tax of 11 cents. On a price of admission from 41 cents to 49 cents, inclusive, a tax of 12 cents. On a price of admission from 50 cents to 74 cents, inclusive, a tax of 15 cents. On a price of admission from 75 cents to \$1.00, inclusive, a tax of 25 cents. On a price of admission over \$1.00, a tax of 35 cents. Persons admitted by "Pass" or "Complimentary Ticket" must pay tax on the maximum price of admission at the performance attended. W. E. MASSEY, Deputy Provincial Treasurer.
