George Vanierstine, postmaster,
who is ill with lung trouble.

The Shakespeare Study Class held
its closing meeting of the season last
evening in Castle Hall which was at-
tended by the members and their
friends. The proceedings opened with
a chorus by the members of the
Class, after which three scenes from
the play Henry IV were given in
character. Between these scenes a
vocal solo, piano duet, a quartette
and gramophone selections were in-
terpersed all of which were of a
high class. The dramatic scenes in-
cluded The Division of the Land,
Choosing the Soldiers (for Falstaff's
ragged Regiment) and the famous
scene as the Boar's Head Tavern.
The rendering of the several scenes
was exceedingly creditable to all
in the cast, showing careful
study, a clear knowledge of the
characters impersonated and
dramatic talent of a high order. It
was an evening of marked enjoyment
throughout, with not a dull moment
from the beginning down to the
National Anthem at the close. The
handsome prize presented by Percy
Stanley for the best paper on the
winter's study was awarded to Mrs.
Milford.

The regular monthly meeting of the
City Council was held last night.
After minutes of previous meeting
were read and a number of bills pass-
ed, communications were read. They
included a request from the Char-
lottetown Driving Park Association
for an increased grant this year to-
wards the Provincial Exhibition; an
application from the P. E. Island
Stockbreeders' Association asking to
rent a room in the Market Hall; a
resolution from the City School
Board requesting the Council to add
\$500 to the estimate of \$600 previ-
ously asked for fire escapes for
schools; and letters asking assistance
for the Quebec Battlefields Project,
and inviting co-operation with a na-
tional Bureau of Health in Ottawa.

In regard to the request for an in-
creased grant the letter was laid on
the table; the request of the Stockbreed-
ers' Association was referred to the
Market Committee; the resolution of
the City School Board was laid on
the table. On motion the City
Clerk was instructed to open a sub-
scription list for the celebration.
Sylvester McDonald as presi-
dent and spokesman of the Truck-
men's Union was heard. He requested
the Council to consider the request
already made that truckmen working
with horses for the City be paid \$3
per day. His Worship promised that
the Council would give the matter
careful attention. His Worship in-
formed the Council that he had re-
ceived the resignation of the Recor-
der, Hon. F. L. Haszard, whose du-
ties as Premier precluded his con-
tinuing in the occupation of the of-
fice. On motion the Council accepted
and John A. McDonald was appointed
Recorder at a salary of \$5
a year. The committee having the
matter in charge suggested that \$20
be paid Mrs. Angus McDonald for in-
jury to linoleum, etc., supplied by
the Council for the basement of
Market House. The Council approved
of the suggestion. Councillor Stew-
art notified the Council that some
new plank sidewalks were needed.
Attention was drawn by Councillor
Campbell to the need of a sidewalk
on Richmond street west, Councillor
Rogers said he approved of Chair-
man Stewart's plan—other needed
sidewalks would be attended to. Mr.
McDonald pointed out that Mr.
Campbell should move a resolution
in amendment to Councillor Stew-
art's plan. Councillor Campbell wish-
ed to know why the members of the
street committee were not consulted
when sidewalks were decided on.
Chairman Stewart regretted that
Councillor Campbell was grieved at
the action of the street committee.
It was the usual plan to have the
City Surveyor decide where new
sidewalks would be placed. Councillor
Stewart presented a by-law to im-
pose a tax on non-resident contrac-
tors and moved that it be read a
first time. Motion carried and the
by-law was read a first and second
and third time and reported agreed
to. Council adjourned.
