CONFERENCE OF PROV. PREMIERS

Not Agreed as to Per Capita Subsidies—Premier Gouin Made Chairman

OTTAWA, Oct. 8.—(Special).—The Provincial Premiers' Conference was opened here this morning, by Sir Wilfrid Laurier with address of welcome to the Provincial representatives whom he said the Federal Government would be glad to meet at any time.

The Federal representatives, Sir Wilfrid, Messrs. Fielding, Aylesworth and Lemieux, retired to give the Provincial representatives an opportunity of discussing their program.

On motion of Premier Whitney, seconded by Premier Roblin, Premier Gouin was made chairman.

It was suggested that the Quebec resolutions of 1902 should be adopted and presented to the Dominion Government.

The Conference signified its practical agreement to the Quebec resolutions with slight changes.

Premier Whitney wanted increased subsidy but objected to the terms.

Premier Peters said the Island did not want the per capita allowance based on the last census returns, as population had decreased. He wants a minimum fixed for the allowance which a decrease in population will not affect.

On the other hand the Premiers of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba want their allowance based upon the census taken this year.

A sub-committee was appointed to revise the resolutions. This will report to the Conference at ten o'clock tomorrow and if their drafts is adopted it will be presented to the Government at eleven o'clock.

This evening the delegates attended a reception by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Tomorrow they may lunch with F. L. Borden.

THE EXHIBITION WAS FORMALLY OPENED

Yesterday Afternoon at Three O'clock By His Honor Lieutenant Governor MacKinnon—The Magnificent Show of Animals—Unequalled Number of Entries—Other Displays Excellent.

The formal opening of the Exhibition took place yesterday afternoon, in rather a cool atmosphere and partly under a cloud but clearing sky. President F. L. Hazard of the Exhibition Association was the first to speak, and read a letter of regret and good wishes from Premier Peters, who was called to Ottawa on important business. Mr Hazard remarked that the show which was now to be presented fulfils the promise made last year of something better than had ever been seen in this Province, the best exhibit of live stock ever seen in the Maritime Provinces. In preparation for this the Association had nearly doubled the capacity of the stock buildings but yet had not space enough, and had been compelled to ask some Island exhibitors to keep their stock at home till the time for judging. He asked such exhibitors to be patient and remember that it was in the interest of our farmers that the best stock had been brought from Western Canada, including some animals valued at \$1,000 to \$6,000 each and which had taken sweepstake prizes at the Dominion Exhibitions. In concluding he introduced the Lieutenant Governor, who was received with cheers and the strains of the National Anthem.

His Honor referred to the Dominion grant of \$10,000 given for the first time to an exhibition here. Both the federal and provincial authorities had jurisdiction in the agriculture but this was the first time the Ottawa authorities had given a grant. He congratulated the directors on securing it. He believed that exhibitors from abroad whom he was glad to see present would have a fair field but no favor, and would carry away good impressions of our Province and its people. Ours is an agricultural Province, with few other industries, a number of these few he was glad to see represented and hoped they would grow and others be added to their number. The exhibits from every Province in the Dominion and the handsome grant from Ottawa served to remind us that we are Canadians. He was glad to see so fine a display of fruit, including apples packed in boxes for shipment, and also the good display of field and dairy products, the latter being the largest ever shown here, though our Province is famous for its cheese and butter. We have a land easily made into one great vegetable garden. What is wanted is more manure and intensive cultivation.

His Honor noted what had been done in raising large values in strawberries on comparatively small plots of ground. This was an instance of what might be done in many lines. No subject was now receiving more attention than agriculture. He complimented our leading merchants on their attractive display, and hoped all would enjoy themselves at the Exhibition which he now formally declared open.

Mayor Pa-on welcomed the visitors from the Island and from abroad. He would like to see the Island represented at the Exhibition next year in Scotland. The display made there in 1901 by the Northwest was bringing out immigrants by the thousand. They had looked upon Canada as a land of sunshine. If they could see our Island products these people would want to come and settle here instead of going 2,000 miles further from home, and from the markets of the world. Superintendent Robertson of the Experimental Farm at Nappan called attention to the Farm's exhibit, including 60 varieties of grain in the straw and otherwise and 100 varieties of grasses grown throughout the Dominion.

Judge Fitzgerald remarked upon the growth of our exhibition since he was first a director, 14 years ago. Then there was one table for fruit where we have 12 today, and there is not half enough room for the cheese and butter. He was sorry they were straightened for room for live stock after expending \$4,000 for new buildings. He reminded the farmers that of the \$4,000 given by the Province and the \$10,000 from Ottawa all was expended in prizes and paying the judges. The directors took chances of bad weather, but had for 14 years given exhibitions each better than the last and this the best of all.

The several addresses were neat, pithy appropriate and well delivered. It was an auspicious opening.

The Exhibition spirit is in the air. The City streets, the Market Square, where the side shows are already at work, to weigh the money from the pockets of those whose curiosity can be excited by the eloquence of the "barkers." In charge, the presence of many strangers, all indicate that it is now "fair time."

This year it is something more than usual. Of that there can be little doubt.

In other years the Directors of the Exhibition Association have depended on their own efforts and the Provincial Government Grant to provide awards, and to meet the large expenses. But this year the Dominion Government has given a grant and the Directors have thus been enabled to enlarge the classes and premiums for exhibits.

This of itself was sufficient to make an exhibition on a larger and more elaborate scale than otherwise would have been expected. But the overwhelming number of entries, especially in live stock is something that has exceeded the anticipation of the most eager of those interested in the affair.

From all the provinces have come horses, cattle, sheep, and pigs to look their best, and to compete with the home product. The home product, by the way has also been travelling—to the exhibitions in the other provinces, with notable success.

Out at the grounds the animals are comfortably housed, and afford subjects for pleasant inspection and study.

Prominent among all others are the cattle. This year the animals which may be seen are it is safe to say, not excelled in Canada. There are the magnificent Shorthorns of Senator Edwards, come all the way from Ontario, and looking as if they had become used to exhibitions. The take the examination of the public in a very unbecoming way. Then there is a handsome herd of Holsteins, and the Herefords, of Mr. Black, of Amberst, are some of the neatest looking that have ever graced the stalls at the exhibition. There is a particularly fine lot of Ayr-

shire, 30 head, the herd of Alexander Hume & Co. of Ontario.

The most picturesque looking among the cattle are perhaps the moosest Jerseys and Guernseys, among the latter the splendid herd of prize winners, owned by Roper Bros. of this Province, being easily conspicuous. Other breeds are represented by capable and interesting looking specimens.

In sheep, which seems to be the speciality of the farmers of this Province all the Island prize winners from the other exhibitions are to be seen on the grounds. These are a large class, embracing all the breeds, and afford those not skilled in sheep raising an interesting study on the varieties of breeds and their different characteristics.

Pigs make a noticeably good showing, the bacon hog being represented to a large extent. Some of the specimens out at the grounds are very fine, and as Kipling says, are "fit for to admire."

The horses are superb. In this connection one's feet stray over to the stables on the other side of the race track where the trotters, including all the time makers at the recent meeting at Halifax are being got ready for the contests of the three days.

Of the different breeds competing for prizes in the show ring it is gratifying to see that the local horses are a splendid collection, and excite the admiration of foreign visitors not previously acquainted with the excellence of the horses of Prince Edward Island.

There is a praiseworthy show of poultry, fine birds being shown in all classes.

Worthy of special mention is the fine Clyde-dale horses from the Heslarie farm, completing the importation from Scotland of last spring. These horses are specially housed, an admirable arrangement.

Entering the main building, the enterprise of local merchants is perhaps the thing which at once impresses the visitor. The booths in which they have displayed samples of their merchandise are patterns of neat and attractive arrangement, and the value of the goods especially furs, must amount to a considerable sum. The general effect is one of luxurious furnishing, which is accompanied by the careful furniture exhibits, and the booths of the dealers in musical instruments.

But not all the interior is taken up thus. Chief of the inside exhibits are the fruit and vegetable classes, and here as proper, the Island does well and truly uphold its title "Garden of the Gulf." It is hard even for a newspaper writer to rhapsodize about the beauty of the ribbed pumpkin, or to glowingly describe the symmetry of the purple-topped rutabaga, and equally so to tell of the satisfying, rosy cheeks of apples that shine tamplingly on their stalks. It must suffice to say that here are to be seen the bounteous fruits of the land, all most excellent of their kind, in profusion and of a quality that makes secure the boast of this Province that its farming advantages are unexcelled.

There is ample cause for congratulation to every patriotic Prince Edward Islander in the survey of the yield of the land here displayed.

NEWFOUNDLAND GOVERNMENT

May Resign in Protest Against the Modus Vivendi—Great Popular Anger.

St. John's, N.F., Oct. 8.—(Special).—The popular anger against the modus vivendi arranged by the British Government with the United States relating to the Newfoundland herring fishery is growing.

Archbishop Hawley proclaims it a shameful betrayal of the Colony's interest and urges the immediate calling of the Legislature and protests to the British Government and all the colonies.

The Premier's organ, the Telegram, condemns the craven policy of Dowling street, and indicates the intention of his Government to show its resentment as the Natal Government did by resigning.

A SIGNIFICANT ROYAL BETROTHAL

St. Petersburg, Oct. 7.—A marriage which is of the greatest significance as binding the new and friendly relations between Great Britain and Russia, has been arranged between the Grand Duke Michael, only brother of Emperor Nicholas, and Princess Patricia of Connaught, daughter of the Duke of Connaught, brother of King Edward. The betrothal occurred during the Grand Duke's recent trip to Copenhagen and Scotland, from which he has just returned. The Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch was born in St. Petersburg November 22, 1878.

SULTAN SAIN TO BE DEPRESSED

VIENNA, Oct. 8.—Private reports from Constantinople state that the Sultan is suffering from deep mental depression as a consequence of his illness, and that his outward appearance has much changed. The deaths within the last few days of two high functionaries at Yildiz Kiosk have made a deep impression upon the monarch. Nisad Efendi who died suddenly two days ago of apoplexy, was the Sultan's translator and political director of foreign correspondence, and enjoyed His Majesty's confidence, while the death of Chief Master of the Ceremonies, Ibrahim Pasha, is now reported.

Based on Legislative Union of the Three Maritime Provinces

St. John, Oct. 8.—(Special).—A new political party is being formed in New Brunswick having in view as its prime object maritime union.

The party will be independent, having a lean towards the Liberal side of politics and will be composed not only of dissatisfied Liberals but of kickers from the Conservative side as well.

Men interested assert that for many reasons they are dissatisfied with the present state of affairs in local politics.

They claim that the Government is rotten, but that the Opposition is worse.

The new platform provides for union of the three Provinces, say under the name of Acadia, one Lieutenant Governor, and the new Government to consist of a Legislative Council composed of two members from each Province in the union, these members to be elected for from three to five years by popular vote.

There shall be an Executive Council consisting of a Premier, Minister of Justice, Minister of Public Works, Minister of Agriculture and Forestry, Minister of Mines and Labor, Minister of Health and Quarantine, Minister of Finance and Education.

The new Government shall also give the municipalities full control of the highways.

BAD COLLISION NEAR SYDNEY

One Man Dead, Another Dying and Nine More Badly Injured

SYDNEY Oct. 8.—(Special).—The worst collision in the history of the Sydney and Louisburg Railway took place near the town reservoir four miles out at three o'clock this afternoon and as a result one man is dead, another dying and nine badly injured.

The accident was due to a collision in a deep cut of the road between construction trains.

Norman McLearn was killed outright and his brother Din is dying.

GALE FOLLOWED BY HEAVY RAIN

BOND CABINET MAY RESIGN
