SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

MAY 10

THE UNJUST STEWARD

LESSON TEXT. Luke xvi. 10. He that is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and he that is unrighteous in a very little is unrighteous also in much.

THE NARRATIVE

Luke links the parable which constitutes our lesson for today with the events in connection with which our Lord had uttered His parable concerning the lost things. Whether it was spoken at the same time it may not be possible to determine, but this does not really matter. There is quite clearly a close connection between its teaching and the words of the occasion. While the parable of lost things was spoken directly to Pharisees and scribes, that which we are now to consider was spoken to the disciples.

The whole value of this lesson is discovered in the fact that it deals with the subject of stewardship. The failure of Pharisees and scribes was the failure of those who at least claimed to be stewards of the Divine law. The men whom the Lord had gathered around Him as disciples were being prepared to fulfil that responsibility.

Recognizing these facts we may turn to the parable. The story is perfectly simple and straightforward. There have, however, been difficulties in the minds of some, as it seems to suggest that the Lord approved of the method of his lord's creditors than they really owed, in order to make a position for himself.

Let us then first glance at the end of the parable, where we find that our Lord said, "The sons of this age are for their own generation wiser than the sons of light." Thus we see that He was making a contrast between the sons of light. Moreover the terms of the contrast are such as reveal the fact that our Lord limited their wisdom to their own generation. The steward who is seen, therefore, was a son of his age. His method was dishonest, but for a man thus limited, his action was wise, that is prudent, in the sense of being clever in one modern use of that word. This recognition was not at all a condemnation of his fraud. Notice also that it is not said that his lord commended him, but that his lord did, who was also of his age. The one value, therefore,

ST FRANCIS XAVIER STUDENT'S FORWARD MOVEMENT.

ANTIGONISH, May 7.—At a meeting held by the St. Francis Xavier Athletic Association on April 28th, the members of the association outlined a campaign for the purpose of having a new rink erected before the celebration of the Diamond Jubilee of the college in 1915. The task at first seemed herculean and almost impossible to accomplish in such a short time. However, judging from the spirit displayed at the meeting and the various plans of organization proposed, there can be no doubt that success will crown the efforts of the St. Francis Xavier students. It is the purpose of the committee appointed by the association to ask the assistance of the Alumni and other friends of St. Francis Xavier's. Entertainments such as concerts, etc., are to be held in the different centers of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and New England. All the students and friends of the institution in these various places are to organize and elect committees to take charge of the movement in their special districts. The general supervision of the campaign is in the hands of a central committee. This committee is composed of W. R. Walsh, B. A. Cambridge, Mass., for the New England States; C. S. Henderson, Parristore, for Nova Scotia; Thomas Traimor, Charlottetown, for Prince Edward Island, and J. R. MacDonald, Mabou, for Cape Breton.

THE TEACHING

The teaching of this lesson for us is found in the actual teaching of Jesus which followed His parable. The parable itself was introductory, emphasizing the one matter of the need for wisdom on the part of stewards. Having thus emphasized this, the Lord proceeded to give an illustration of how wisdom in that higher realm would operate. Here every thing moves to a higher level, and into a clearer atmosphere. In this teaching we have a revelation of the wisdom of those who are stewards of the Kingdom of Heaven. The story of the parable had moved within the realm of material wealth, that is of mammon. Fastening upon that, and retaining it to illustrate the higher wisdom, our Lord shows how mammon is to be used by stewards of the Kingdom of God. One glance beyond our lesson at verses fourteen and fifteen will reveal to us the reason of our Lord's choice of illustration, as these verses chronicle the effect produced upon the Pharisees, "they scoffed at Him because they were lovers of money."

The first words of Jesus by way of application constituted definite instruction as to the true use of money. His disciples are to use it in order to make friends, not for the present life, but for the eternal habitation, that is for them life that lies beyond, when wealth shall no longer have any power. The whole philosophy of the relation of a Christian man to money is contained in this illuminative word. He is ever to use it in the interest of the final spiritual things. All money invested in the seeing and the saving of the lost is money which is making friends in this highest way. Or more broadly, all wealth used in the work of Christ, whether it be in immediate relief of suffering, or in those higher activities which are for the saving of men, is wealth used wisely according to spiritual standards.

The question of stewardship being involved, our Lord followed this instruction with an argument for its accuracy, as He said, "He that is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and he that is unrighteous in a very little is unrighteous also in much." The force of this statement being not that if a man shows faithfulness in the use of wealth he is to be trusted with stewardship in higher realm, but rather that when a man is faithful in the little of material wealth, it is because he is faithful in the responsibilities, the much of spiritual things.

This argument was immediately followed by two questions. The answer to the first is that no one will commit the trusteeship of spiritual things to those who are unfaithful in material things, proves either infidelity or incapacity in spiritual things. The answer to the second question is also that no one will give ven that which is their own if they have not been faithful in trusteeship. Failure in stewardship is failure in personal life, and a man comes into the true possession of that which belongs to himself only through faithfulness in his dealing with that which belongs to others.

The whole principle is finally expressed in the words, "Ye cannot serve God and Mammon."
