## WOLVES KEEP ALLAN CUP IN MARITIMES

### Will Represent Canada In 1936 Olympic Games

#### Wolves Defeat Bearcats In Second Game 4-3. Hudson, McGlashen & Lennon Outstanding In Series.

HALIFAX, April 17—This seaport city drank from the Allan Cup for the first time in her colorful history tonight after her Wolverines defeated Port Arthur Bearcats 4-3, to make it "two straight" in the Canadian amateur hockey championship finals.

With the battered silverware and the Dominion title, Jack Conn's valiant pack won the right to represent Canada at the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin, and even the heroes wanted in the professional ranks intimated they would shun contracts to make the trip.

**HUDSON OUTSTANDING**  
To blond Ron Hudson, who came down from South Porcupine, Ont., four years ago, went the honors for tonight's triumph. With a record of having scored in every play-off game since the Wolves started against Charlottetown in February, the brilliant right winger drove home two goals for Halifax in the stalling second period. Mickey McGlashen and Owen Lennon, his mates on the Wolverine first string of snipers, accounted for the other two, while Port Arthur's scores came from the sticks of Bill Thompson, Jimmy Hagarty and Num Friday.

**Fans Go Wild**  
More than 5,000 fans went wild as President E. Gilroy presented the 27-year old trophy to Captain Ernie Mosher. They were pleased to hold the honor Moncton Hawks had brought to the Maritimes for the first time in 1933 but their greatest tributes went to Jack Conn, who had held his team together with sheer pluck even after the Maritime Hockey League crumbled around him.

And they didn't forget the brave stand of the "home brew" team from the West which had gone down to defeat before an outfall collected over the country in eight years since its first took a liking to the trophy.

Before the final bell the crowd was rooting for Milton, Hagarty and Thompson, even when they threatened to tie the count.

A little over confident after Monday night's 3-2 win, the Wolverines were discouraged in the second opening period tonight but in the middle session they struck the stride that had carried them over Montreal Royals in the Eastern championship battle.

**McGlashen Opens Scoring**  
McGlashen, curly center who shared honors with Hudson and Ferguson on the series, snapped in the first goal on a cool pass from defenceman Frankie Graham.

Less than two minutes later he gave Hudson the rubber for the Wolves to take the lead. The puck was not until after the halfway mark that the Bearcats clicked.

### SENATORS DEFEAT ATHLETICS 4-2

President Roosevelt officiates at opening—Detroit Tigers lose to Chicago.

NEW YORK, April 17—Washington Senators unworked a savage first inning bombardment before President Roosevelt here today to win their delayed American League baseball inaugural with Philadelphia's Athletics 4-2.

Punching out four singles in rapid order to score three runs and adding another counter in the second inning, the Senators thrashed 21,000 spectators by their quick assault, the A's were never able to equal.

Jimmy Foxx, the former first baseman starting his first season behind the plate, was off to a fine start in the home run derby with a long drive into the left field bleachers in the eighth inning that scored Wallace Moses ahead of him with Philadelphia's only runs.

**Roosevelt Cheered**  
Mr. Roosevelt, accompanied by an official party, was cheered lustily as he performed his annual pitching of the ball to the first batter. The presidential throw was a high lob toward the infield, which was caught by Washington's pitcher, Bob Burke in a mad race among the players.

### NAVY TEAM RETAIN HOOP TITLE

Completely outplaying their opponents in the second half after battling through an even first period Navy basketball team captured their third straight Holy Name Club title last night when they defeated the Falcons by a 46-27 count in the fourth game of the playoff series.

As rugged and fast a game as has been played on the Club floor in years saw 40 penalties handed out by referees Bill Farbridge and Cyril Ryan with the winners being the big offenders drawing 24 of them.

**BUT THIS YEAR** sees a different ending to the story. The hardships and trial which those backing the squad and the members themselves have had to undergo will be forgotten in the proud flush of victory and no longer the backers of the team will say to a man that it was "well worth it. Maritime fans also will be rejoicing that the Wolves saw fit to carry on C.A.H.A. rulings to the Maritime Hockey League into the tunnel early in the season just closed.

**AND HERE'S** a bouquet for Coach Red Stuart on his year in the Allan Cup playoffs. "This has been a hard series with Port Arthur," he said. "They are a very nice club and I was sure glad when the bell rang ending tonight's play."

**NAVY AND H-I-Y** Grads will battle it out for city basketball honors in the near future. Champions of the Holy Name Club and Y.M.C.A. respectively the finalists should provide a stirring series. Both employ a widely different style of play that is equally baffling to their opponents.
