## ILLNESS OF NICHOLAS

Does Not Improve—King Oscar III—Cruel German Warfare.

### INHUMAN GERMAN METHODS.

BERLIN, Nov. 20.—(Special)—There was a wild scene in the Reichstag on Monday when many members branded as inhuman the German methods of warfare in China and read scores of letters from soldiers groving the charges.

### CZAR'S CONDITION NOT SO FAVORABLE.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—(Special)—The Czar's condition is not so favorable to-day but he is believed not to be in danger.

[Nicholas II, Czar of Russia was born May 18, 1868 and succeeded his father Alexander III Nov. 1, 1894. He is married to the Princess Alice, daughter of the Princess Alice of Great Britain and granddaughter of Queen Victoria. They have three daughters but no son. Until the birth of a son to the reigning Czar his brother the Grand Duke George, born in 1871, is heir to the throne.]

### KING OSCAR OF SWEDEN ILL.

King Oscar swooned away and has suffered two paralytic strokes but his condition is not alarming.

[Oscar II, King of Sweden and Norway, was born in January, 1829, and is the grandson of Napoleon's Marshal Bernadotte. King Oscar succeeded his brother Charles XV in 1872. He is a poet and author of some note. His eldest son, the Crown Prince Gustavus, was born in 1858.]

## ST. JOHN ELECTION ECHOES

I thought you would not be displeased if an old acquaintance dropped you a line or two, just at this time, and gave you my impressions and thoughts about the election battle which has just been lost and won.

For weeks before the usual ward meetings, as you remember were held, and "Brown" "He is all right," "Jones," "He is doubtful," "Robinson" "He is agin us," "Smith" "I'll see him," were gone through in crowded committee rooms of old men and young; with the smell of bad cigars, clouds of smoke and bad ventilation. I tell you that there were pleasant places to spend an evening in, and my opinion is that the doctors will have something to do if there are such things as microbe breeders.

Wednesday, the 7th was a beautiful fall day, pleasant and warm, an ideal day for voters and canvassers. The workers on each side were early on the grounds, nearly an hour before the polls opened, like old war-horses eager for the fray. The fight was practically over at dinner time, for at that hour the bulk of the voters had deposited their ballots, and in the last hour there were no 50 ballots polled over the whole city.

I cannot conceive how the Conservatives thought they were going to win. Yet I honestly think they thought so, when the merest tyro in political forecasts (whose mind was not biased) knew they never had a chance from the first. There were few that predicted 1000 majority for

Blair. The general impression was that he would lead from 300 to 500; Tucker from 150 to 300.

Since Hon Isaac Burpee's time the Liberals here have had no leader till the wise Premier called on Mr. Blair and I can tell you he managed New Brunswick with great tact and skill. Of course Mr. Blair was lucky, for everything seemed to play into his hands. In the first place he solidified the Liberal vote. Then his attitude with the C. P. R. won scores of votes. Then there was a reptile club got up here which repelled decent people and sent them over to Blair. Again Messrs. Foster and Stockton made by their speeches a bad case very much worse. They were very small and puerile, their arguments consisted in ingenious twistings of what their opponents stated.

And the Montreal Star, which has quite a circulation here, by its pernicious course, won quite a number of votes for the Liberals. All these things were combined with the splendid record of the Liberal Government for the past four years, and especially what Mr. Blair has done for St. John. How could it be otherwise, but to send him and his colleagues back with such splendid majorities. Yes, all the merchants on Dock St., all on King St., (but four), the North and South Wharf, with five exceptions, were all Blair and Tucker men.

### A MANAGER FOR CUP DEFENDER.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—The challenge committee and the members of the syndicate who are looking after the defence of the American's Cup seem to be having trouble in finding a yachtsman who is willing to devote his time next summer to the affairs of the new boat. A number of persons have been considered and several asked to accept the place, but all declined. Last week E. A. Willard was talked of as the man for the place, but his name met with some opposition. Charles Francis Adams, 2d, of Boston, was asked to undertake the job. Mr. Adams is one of the best amateur navigators in the country, and his selection would have been a very popular one, but Mr. Adams has declined as he cannot spare the time. Now Archibald Rogers, who was at the head of the Colonial syndicate in 1893, has been asked if he would manage the new boat, but so far has not given his answer.

In the meantime work on the challenge is going on and Sir Thomas Lipton is making no secret of what he is doing to try and "lift the cup." David Barrie, who acts for Sir Thomas in this country, has received information about the new Shamrock which he made public yesterday. He said:

"The Shamrock II. will be built at Henderson's yard near Glasgow, and she is to be ready for her trial against Shamrock I. in May. As soon as she had been tried the two boats will start across the Atlantic together, and they will be tried off Sandy Hook. Sir Thomas Lipton has noticed that on this side the opinion has been that he waited until he was thoroughly prepared before challenging again and that consequently he has an advantage over the defenders."

### THEY'RE STILL ROCKFELLER'S.

DULUTH, Minn., Nov. 17.—It is reported among vessel men that the Bessemer Steamship Company, of which John D. Rockefeller owns practically all the stock, has transferred the big fleet of whalebacks to the Consolidated Iron Mines, of which J. D. Rockefeller also owns about all the stock. The fleet consists of 30 whalebacks and an equal number of other large steamers.

## KILLED AT PICTOU.

Body Taken To P. E. Island on The Electra.

A terrible accident occurred at Pictou on Monday night when Ernest, son of Neil Munn, of Wood Islands, met a horrible death by being killed by the midnight train coming into Pictou.

Very little particulars are obtainable except that the young man was only 19 years of age and left his home in Wood Islands on Friday last and went to Pictou in a schooner owned by Mr. A. J. Taylor. The body was taken by the Electra to Murray Harbor yesterday and was removed by carriage to his home.

Up to a late hour last night the hour of the funeral had not been decided upon. Mr. Brown, son of Capt. Brown of the S. S. Stanley accompanied remains to Murray Harbor.
