ARCHITECTS are invited to submit sketch designs in a preliminary competition for the erection of Departmental and Court Buildings. From the designs submitted in this preliminary competition six will be chosen by the assessors the authors of which will be invited to submit more matured designs in a final competition, for which the five successful competitors shall each receive an honorarium of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00).

The author of the design placed first by the assessors will be entrusted with the work which the government intends carrying out at once. The competition is limited to British Subjects practicing in the British Empire. The Government has appointed Mr. T. G. Colcutt, Mr. J. H. G. Russell and Mr. J. O. Marchand, as Assessors to act in its behalf.
