LETTER FROM PTE. JAMES MATHESON.

BLOEMFONTEIN, March 16th DEAR FATHER.—I am well so far and hope this will find you and mother and the children well. We have had a hard time of it to get here. We marched and fought for 200 miles, had two battles and three or four small scraps with the enemy, and then we got them on the run and kept them running for 100 miles so they could not get into positions so as to make a stand. We chased them twelve miles the other side of Bloemfontein. They all left the town and in twenty-four hours we had trains running from Bloemfontein to De Aar. The bridge over the Orange River was smashed but they ran a scow to make connections between the trains. We had a hard time of it for we were on half rations. Think of going through rivers and streams, wet night and day and no sleep, for more than a month and a half. There were 60,000 men moving all at once; we cleaned up the Orange Free State right ahead of us and now we have got them. We expect to be stationed here for some time for I think the war is over. Of course you know more about the war than we do out here for all we hear is what the Brigade we are in knows. We are under the command of Brigadier General Smith-Dorrien. There are four regiments under him the Gordon Highlanders, Cornwall Light Infantry the Shropshire Light Infantry and the Canadians. It is pretty hard to tell one regiment from another except the Highlanders; they wear kilts with a brown front. I have got some of the Highlander's badges. The Gordon Highlanders fought alongside of us on the 18th. I got the badges from them. They are the nicest men of the British army and the best fighters, except ourselves, so Lord Roberts tell us. He addressed us after the attack made on the 27th. You know Cronje surrendered to us. We all felt bad about Riggs and Taylor and those that were wounded; but the wounded are getting along all right. Tell the boys McLean and I are fine. We never fell out of the ranks once on the march, but some of them did and we are all here now. We chased the Boers one day from two in the morning till five in the evening, over hills and through rivers up to your neck in water. We made 24 miles that day; some days we made 10 miles, some 16, and some 20 miles. We had always to get to water and it took no small river to water the men and horses.

I cannot tell you anything about the city for I have not been in it yet, but nearly all the boys have been in. Only four men and two non-com's are

Much sympathy is expressed for the family in their bereavement. Miss Carey leaves this morning for Halifax from which point she will sail on the new liner for England to spend the summer with relatives. Miss Carey will be very much missed by her many friends during her absence who all cordially unite in wishing her a pleasant trip and visit. Mrs. Carvell will accompany Miss Carey to Halifax. I do not think you need answer this letter for we expect to be on our way home before you get this, at least that is the opinion of the officers of the regiment. Some of the London Volunteers are getting ready to go home now. Tell Walter I will answer his letter tomorrow.
