The Executive of the P. E. I. Silver Fox Breeders Association are now issuing the legal blanks for registration to all those who have applied for the same.

Welfare of the Industry

For the future welfare of the industry it is desirable that every fox on the Island be registered.

There is no other way in which the confidence of the investor can be held and therefore every one who is interested in the breeding of foxes should join the association and have their animals registered.

We are now asking for the facts legally affirmed, upon which classification must be based.

Conditions

The foxes of members only and individual Companies are eligible for registration.

The fee for registration must accompany the registration papers.

Fees

Registration fee for silver foxes \$5.00 per pair (to be forwarded with papers) Registration fee for patch or cross foxes \$2.50 per pair (to be forwarded with papers).

Identification

At the earliest moment so as not to interfere with the mating season the Executive will proceed with the marking for identification and classification of foxes when the balance of the fee, if any, as may be decided at the annual meeting of the association, can be paid.

Previously, the Council had decided to allow the woollen manufacturing company exemption from taxation for ten years up to a valuation of \$35,000 and to make them a grant of \$600 a year for five years. These concessions did not meet with the approval of the promoters, and in consequence of their dissatisfaction the Council last night considered the question of extending them. After discussion, they did so by removing the limit of \$35,000 and leaving the company the privilege of exemption from taxation altogether for ten years. The Mayor presided at the meeting, at which there was a full attendance of Councilors.

As to the bridge, it may be stated that its length is 2,592 feet, making it the longest bridge on the Island, with the exception of the Hillsborough bridge. The arches are 518 feet long, being built on concrete piles with steel spans. The east approach has a length of 1,050 feet, while the west approach is 1,024 feet in length. These are of crib-work. The roadway of the new bridge is between three and four feet higher than the old bridge. A feature of the new structure is a woven wire railing, three feet high, running the full length of the bridge.
