PARRSBORO CAPTAIN 97 YEARS OLD AND STILL SAILS SEAS

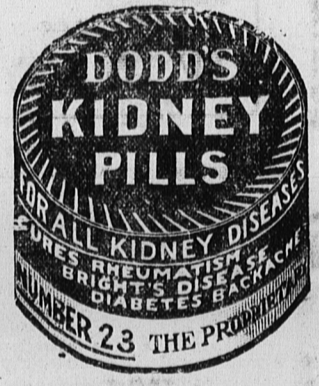
