**MONTREAL, March 4 (CP)—**There were 18 cattle, 512 hogs, 238 calves for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. Calves were slow and prices about steady. Other kinds of livestock remained unchanged. There were not enough cattle offered to make a market. Calves were selling slowly at about steady prices. The bulk of the calves were sold between \$10.50 and \$11.50 with an odd small sale up to \$13. There were no tops. Hogs were \$15.50 for B-1 dressed. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$8.50 to \$9 live weight. On the Maritime market rail grade hogs were \$15.15, rail grade sows number one up to 270 pounds \$10.75, number one over 270 pounds \$9.75, number two undesirable all weights \$8.75. Choice steers \$10, good \$9.25, medium \$8.75, fair \$7, common \$6.75 down. Choice heifers \$9, good \$8.25, medium \$7.75, fair \$6.25, common \$5.50 down. Good cows \$7.50, medium \$6.50, fair \$5.50. Canners \$4 down, cutters \$4.75 down. Boning bulls \$6 down, butcher bulls \$7.50 down. No quotation on veal and lambs.

#### Finance

**NEW YORK, March 4 (AP)—**Eagerness of market followers to collect the small profits accruing from the previous day's rise worked against stock prices today. Canadian stocks were irregular. Canadian Bell Telephone led the gainers, up three points to 115 while Walkers and Imperial Oil each advanced 1-4. Canadian Pfd "B" paced the losers, off one point. Canadian Pacific, Dome Mines and Lake Shore each lost 1-8 and International Nickel 1-4. Unchanged was Distillers Secarum. The Associated Press 60-stock composite recorded a net decline of 2 of a point at 36.8. Transactions again were at a crawling pace and totalled 375,670 shares compared with yesterday's 409,120. Among stocks in the losing division were U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown Sheet, Sears Roebuck, General Motors, Chrysler, United Aircraft, Boeing, Douglas, Owens-Illinois, Southern Pacific, Santa Fe, N.Y. Central and Standard Oil (N.J.). American Telephone dipped 2 1-8 and Du Pont gave up 1 3-4. Allied Chemical and American Can retained moderate advances.

#### Toronto Exchange

**TORONTO, March 4 (CP)—**The mining list displayed mild weakness in today's operations on the Toronto stock exchange and the industrial and western oils closed slightly higher. Volume was only fair at 70,000 shares. A soft tone prevailed for the golds throughout the session and an index loss of .32 was showing at the close. Dome and Hollinger were a bit heavy and the close was down 4 to 6 cents for Beatle Gold, Malaric Gold Fields, Pioneer, Preston and Upper Canada. Bralome weakened 20 cents to 7.25. A few reds held to the up side. Among them Conlarum, Kerr-Addison, Lake Shore and Sullivan. The base metal stocks moved in slight volume with Nickel, Hudson Bay and Smelters unchanged and Noranda down 1-8 to 43 7-8. Falconbridge weakened 8 cents to 292. Ventures 10 cents to 3.50 and Normetal firmed a cent to 79. A gain of 5 points to 85 on 200 shares of Canada Packers was the widest change in the industrial list. Fanny Farmer gained 1-4 to 25 1-2 and other foods, including A.P. Grain pfd and Canners A, dropped small fractions. The steel, Imperial, British American and International Petroleum, were stronger by 1-8 to 1-4. Western oils had a full day and the price adjustments involved a loss of 2 cents for Anglo-Canadian to 41 and minor gains for British-Dominion and South End Petroleum.

**MONTREAL, March 4 (CP)—**The general trend was downward at the close today of the stock exchange and curb market though here and there favorites clung to early gains. Volume was on a reduced scale. Decco "B" which has picked up gains recently on the stock exchange, slipped a little in industrial and Dominion Coal preferred was also in arrears. Others in the minus camp in the group were Alcohol "A", and Building Products. The newspapers, St. Lawrence Corporation "A" and Price Brothers were firmer along with Hamilton Bridge, Foundation and Canadian Car preferred. Bell Telephone and Shawinigan were winners in utilities but Gatlneau and Southern Canada Power trekked back. C.P.R. was shaded in carriers. Down in metals and mines were Hudson Bay Mining and Hollinger while International Pete was fractionally better in oils. Imperial Tobacco preferred and Lake of the Woods were easier in miscellaneous and Distillers-Seagram recovered an opening slip. Total sales: 8,000 shares; Industrials, 5,500; Mines, 2,500.
