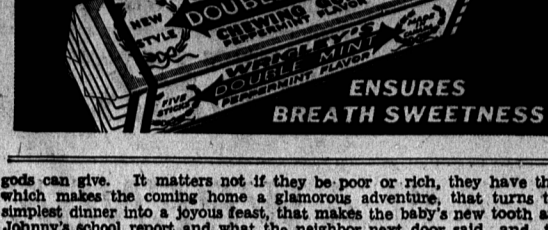

Place beef in bottom of kettle, then add the pork and veal. Cover with boiling water and cover pot closely. Cook slowly in a tightly covered kettle always adding salt and pepper to taste while cooking.

If the stock does not jelly, bring it to the boil and in each 2 cups of stock dissolve 2 teaspoons gelatine. Sauté in 2 tablespoons cold water. Four over meat and chill until firm.

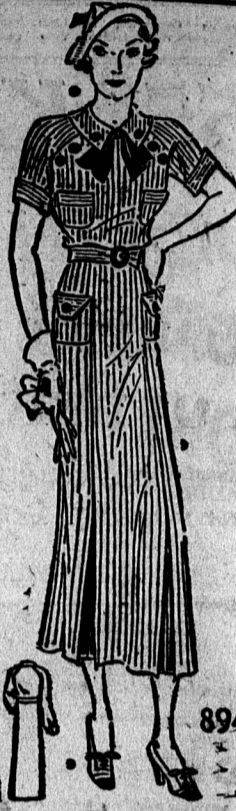
The regular monthly meeting of St. Catherine's W.I. met at the home of Mrs. Tom Morrow.
