Frost May Catch Autumn Mums

The brilliant show of garden chrysanthemums at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, is still fresh in the memory of gardeners, says R.W. Oliver of the Horticultural Division. A brief discussion of their performance this, and other years, may save future disappointments and headaches to unwary enthusiasts.

Ever since Mr. A. M. Cummings of Bristol, Connecticut, introduced the varieties known as Korean hybrids, a considerable collection of outdoor chrysanthemums has been grown in the garden at the Central Experimental Farm. From 1911 to 1948, a considerable number have been tested each year since 1936 under Ottawa conditions of climate and length of daylight.

To prove satisfactory at Ottawa and in parts of Canada with similar weather, a variety must be hardy enough to come through the average winter under ordinary coverage. At least one or two new divisions must remain alive at the base of each old plant to carry on the show. Also, because severe frost may be expected at Ottawa any time after September 15, a variety must be in full bloom before that date in order to justify space in the garden. These two rigid conditions are a severe test that delivers a knockout blow to many of the most widely advertised American and English varieties.

This year, however, nature played an unusual prank that gave these later blooming varieties a chance to steal the show. No severe frost was experienced until Oct. 20. Many of the varieties which drew the most attention this year had only started to bloom other years when the frost destroyed them; some had never bloomed at all. Among them the following varieties made an outstanding show this year: Caesar; Harbour Lights; Jean Harbridge; Maroon 'n' Gold; Rod Osprey; Ronald; Rosalinda; Salmon Lovelace.

In spite of the attention they attracted this year, these varieties should be planted very sparingly in the spring, because nature is not apt to bring another frost free fall.
