3 SENTENCED TO DEATH

Millen Brothers And Abraham Faber To Die Week of April 28th.

DEDDHAM, Mass., Feb. 26 — The Millen brothers and Abraham Faber today were sentenced to die in the electric chair during the week of April 28 as the penalty for the slaying of policeman Norman McLeod, a native of Guysboro, N. S. Hardly had Judge Nelson P. Brown consigned them to death than defence attorneys set about to utilize the last legal means at their command to save the lives of the three slayers. The defence is entitled to 90 days in which to appeal to the United States supreme court.

MUSSOLINI LAYS BARE MAN-POWER

Seven To Eight Million Men Stand Ready To Call To Arms.

(Canadian Press, by Guardian's Special Wire) ROME, Feb. 26. — Benito Mussolini tonight told the world in general, and Ethiopia in particular, that Italy can mobilize seven to eight million men "to face any eventuality."

A "to whom it may concern" communique said two new army divisions are being constituted to replace the two, numbering some 15,000 men, mobilized for service in East Africa.

In addition, it said, Italian factories are receiving orders for war materials equal to the quantities of arms, ammunition and other supplies being sent to Eritreah and Italian Somaliland, Italy's colonies in Africa bordering Emperor Haile Selassie's Ethiopian domain.

COMPLICATIONS IMPROBABLE

European complications "seem to be improbable in the present period," the communique said, following the Rome and London agreements. Nevertheless, it continued: "To face any eventuality, it is to be recalled, in consequence of the new Fascist laws extending military obligations to from 15 to 55 years Italy can mobilize 37 classes with total effectiveness of between seven and eight million men."

Foreign diplomats believed one purpose of the statement was to give notice to Paris, London and Berlin that Italy must not be neglected in negotiations now going on among them and also to warn Germany that Italy is keeping her eyes upon the Austrian situation despite the preparations she is making in Africa.

SHIP SENDS FRANTIC SOS

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—The British freighter Blairgowrie called for help tonight, saying it was in a "desperate situation" with no steering gear and its hold "full of water."

The Inera Europa and American Banker wireless they were proceeding to the aid of the distressed vessel, which was in the North Atlantic channel en route to Boston from Swansea, Wales.

The American Banker told radiomarine corporation it was encountering "mountainous seas." It was about 30 miles away.

The Europa, 60 miles away, reported to the North German Lloyd line in New York that it was in a "heavy westerly gale." Radio marine said the American Banker reported the Blairgowrie had 25 men aboard.

Committee To Study B.N.A. Act

Committee Will Report To Parliament On Best Way Of Amending Constitution.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Feb. 26.—The problem of how Canada should go about amending the British North America Act, this country's constitution, today engaged attention of special Parliamentary committee created for its study.

The committee, under chairmanship of F. W. Turnbull (Cons. Regins), heard W. Stuart Edwards, Deputy Minister of Justice, expound the law as it related to provincial rights and other precedents to be followed by the committee in pursuit of its object.

Specifically the committee's duty is to report to the House of Commons on the best way of amending the constitution so that, while safeguarding existing rights of racial and religious minorities and legitimate provincial claims to autonomy, the Dominion Government may be given adequate power to deal effectively with urgent economic problems which are essentially national in scope.

Premier Is Recovering From Cold

Bennett remained in his apartment today, transacting necessary functions of office there while recuperating from a slight cold contracted last week-end. Mr. Bennett was much improved but stayed indoors as a precautionary measure.

CONCLUDE LONDON VISIT

Austrian Chancellor Satisfied With Outcome of Negotiations.

(By Albert W. Wilson, Associated Press Staff Writer) (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Feb. 26.—Austria's Chancellor and Foreign Minister left for home tonight confident Great Britain would press for Germany's adherence to the Rome pact, designed to guarantee Austria's independence.

While British sleuths peered under their railway coaches in case radicals had placed bombs, Egon Berger-Waldenegg, the Foreign Minister, told the Associated Press that the principal purpose of Anglo-Austrian conversations here had been to "assure the independence of Austria for ever—not for just some period of years."

He expressed satisfaction that the British are wholeheartedly behind the Rome accords, that these must be completed simultaneously with other phases of the recent Anglo-French proposals for an inclusive European security agreement.

The last British authorities continued their almost unprecedented precautions to guard Berger-Waldenegg and Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg against molestation or bodily harm.
