AMERICAN TROOPS TO WITHDRAW FROM CUBA
 HAVANA, Dec. 29—New Year's Day will witness the beginning of the evacuation of Cuba by the army of pacification, which has been in possession of the island since the beginning of the provisional government, October, 1906. The first provisional regiment of marines, numbering about nine hundred, which will be the first troops to leave, are now concentrating from various posts at Camp Columbia. About half this regiment will sail from Havana on January 1 on the cruiser Prairie, which arrived here Christmas Eve, bound for Newport News. The Prairie will return about the middle of the month and embark the remainder. The last of the troops will embark April 1.
