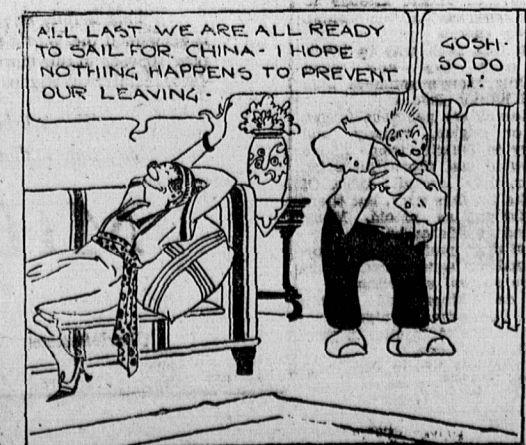

Mr. James F. Hughes of Drogheda, acted as chairman for the event. The parting address was read by Mrs. James O. Trainor, and the presentation made by Mr. Patrick Duffy. An able and instructive address was delivered by Father O'Brien, who in glowing terms thanked the members of the reception committee, and all those that contributed in any way towards the presentation. He also spoke on the beauties of Prince Edward Island advising the youth of the land to cultivate a love for the dear island home. He also spoke of the unhappy events of so many going away to foreign places and leaving the Island desolated of its population especially its youth. The Rev. Father Allen spoke, also Mr. J. H. The following is the address. ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION The Rev. John E. O'Brien.

Rev. and dear Father: As we learn that your leave of absence is drawing to a close, we take advantage of this opportunity to bid you good-bye, and, at the same time, to tender you a humble tribute of appreciation.

We hope that your vacation was a pleasant one—both restful and refreshing. Your visits to the Island and to your native parish are always hailed with delight by many friends; and, in revisiting this time the scenes and associations of other days, old friendships ever dear, have, we feel sure, been renewed and strengthened. Your gracious personality, your eloquence, your piety, and your sympathetic interest in our spiritual and temporal welfare have endeared you to every member of our congregation; and we rejoiced to say you with us again, although the thought of our parting—like a shadow—ever hovered near.

Your going away is a distinct loss to the province. Men of your outstanding ability are needed here as well as elsewhere. TO REDUCE FREIGHT RATES TO UNITED KINGDOM PORTS NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—A general reduction in ocean freight rates to ports in the United Kingdom, effective next Monday, by arrangement with members of the United Kingdom Conference, was announced here today, following a two-day session of the conference. The reductions range from 5 to as much as 40 per cent. below recent rates.

AUSTRIANS GLOOMY AS TO THE FUTURE LONDON, Oct. 9.—The people of Austria are hoarding their money; it would take 10,000,000 pounds to place Austria on her feet again financially, yet Austrians have in Swiss banks an amount estimated at 18,000,000 pounds.

These statements are contained in a report made by the British department of overseas trade on the economic condition of Austria. In summing up the Austrian situation this report says:

"The psychological difficulty is the prevalent pessimism which inhibits initiative on the part of the Austrians themselves, and makes them look solely abroad for salvation. The amount of foreign credits generally estimated to be necessary to place Austria on its feet again by stabilizing the currency and founding a new bank of issue is about 10,000,000 pounds.

"It is an open secret that, despite the law to the contrary very much larger sums in foreign currencies than this are hoarded by Austrians both inside and outside the country; the amount lying in Swiss banks alone has been estimated at 18,000,000 pounds.

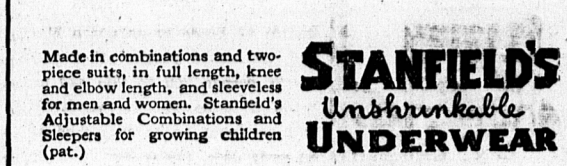
"But these resources lie idle because the owners have no confidence in the government or the future of the country. Probably both the political and psychological difficulties can be overcome most easily by financial assistance given by foreigners under suitable control and conditions. The Austrians however, must show that they are ready to co-operate by taking at least the first steps to put their house in order themselves. There is some prospect of this being done at an early date."

FRANCE WARNS GREEK GOVERNMENT LONDON, Oct. 9.—A Reuters dispatch from Athens dated Saturday says the Greek Government has received a severe warning from France against the despatch of reinforcements to Thrace.
