### SONS OF MILLIONAIRES.

Something has been written of late about sundry American millionaires who had themselves begun life at the foot of the ladder and are now compelling their sons to do likewise, that is select some useful calling, learn it thoroughly and follow an industrious life. Among the millionaires reported to have adopted this course for their sons is the well-known Richard Croker, the "Boss" of Tammany. Of course the sons of millionaires, however illiterate their fathers may have been, must attend school and college and have the opportunity at least of acquiring a liberal education. After that comes the selection of a life calling and the special study, or work required to master its details.

For instance, Boss Croker's son, Mr. Richard Croker, Junior, having completed his school and college course, has decided that he will become a lawyer, and this is the way he sets about it, according to the Chicago Tribune:

Ten thousand dollars' worth of imported English bull pups, a complete stable of blooded horses, forty suits of clothes, a country place, and a retinue of English servants form part of the equipment with which Richard Croker, Jr., has descended upon Cornell University, in which institution it is announced the crown prince of the house of Croker will incidentally study law.

Mr. Richard Croker, Senior, in the Presidential campaign now going on has delivered one or two brief speeches in his own way in which he has expressed great interest in and concern for the young men of his country. "What show has a young feller in this country nowadays," he asked, in one of these public addresses. Meanwhile his own son, with the noble purpose of studying law, has taken a country seat near Cornell and is beginning to unpack his trunks, which contain, on the authority of his groom, forty suits of clothes costing from \$50 to \$100 a suit. He has also sent for his tandem team, and hopes to get his special dog kitchen, where sirloin steaks are cooked rare for his \$10,000 canines, in good running order within a short time.

workshop at board wages, tolling early and late. What a farce it all is.
