Art Of Feeding Proteins To Pigs

A young pig can be helped to make good growth by feeding it a protein supplement. For this purpose many farmers feed their pigs skinned milk and buttermilk, but other farmers with no milk for feeding mix 12 pounds of concentrate in every 100 pounds of the grain ration.

BEER PARLOURS RAIDED

THE BANK OF MONTREAL

Final Crop Report says: Harvesting of all crops in the Maritimes was carried out under generally favourable conditions. The hay crop was average in quantity but of inferior quality. Grains were a short crop in some sections due to late planting and excessive moisture but yields were about average, except in Prince Edward Island where the harvest of both grains and hay was good. Pastures were in very good condition throughout the season. Despite some damage from disease, potatoes made excellent progress. The yield in New Brunswick is heavy but in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island below average. Other roots developed well. Apple picking is under way and the harvest is estimated to be in excess of last year although below the average for the past five years. Blueberries were plentiful and small fruits yielded well.

Many farmers feed their pigs skinned milk and buttermilk, but other farmers with no milk for feeding mix 12 pounds of concentrate in every 100 pounds of the grain ration. If hog producers were to increase the protein supplement from 12 to 24 pounds, the pig might not grow any faster than when it was getting a normal amount of protein. Farmers should use carefully high protein supplements of all kinds. Unnecessarily large amounts of concentrates have been fed on some farms to pigs which could eat along without it. Supplies of commercial protein feeds are limited and it is only by using these feeds and dairy by products in the way to do most good that the large number of pigs required can be raised successfully and cheaply. A good protein supplement is a body builder. Adequate amounts of protein should be fed to young pigs if their growth is to be normal, but any additional amount over that required to give a young pig growth is wasted. A young pig uses excess protein only for energy or fattening. Farmers agree that there are cheaper ways of putting fat on a pig than by laying out money for protein supplements. Proteins are necessary for young pigs, and pregnant or nursing sows. But when a pig reaches 100 pounds it will make reasonably good growth on feed grains alone. By limiting protein supplements to young pigs, more hogs can be raised on the same amount of purchased supplements.
