Simon Nicholson as auctioneers.

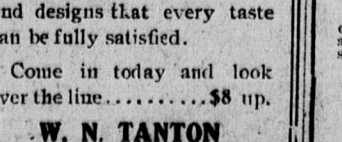
After God Save the King was sung

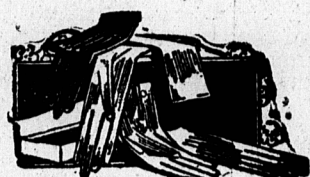

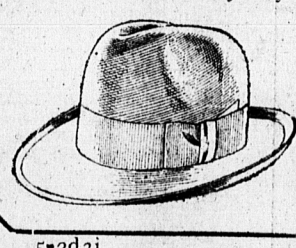

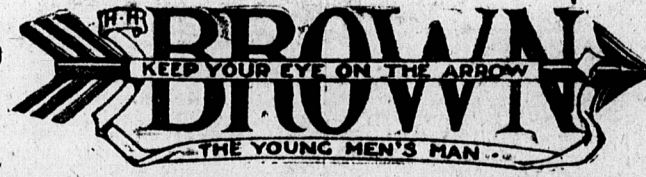

There is early frost or hail in sections.
I am not a pessimist or a knock-
er in this country. There is a great
field in the West for overcrowded
communities. And conditions will
brighten as the years go by for those
who instead of following the one-crop
system will give attention to stock
and dairy farming.
But to sum up advantages pro and
con. The Western Provinces cannot be
a community of homes such as are
found on P. E. Island. Trees are
hard to grow. Water in many sec-
tions is bad and hard to get.
Streams are rare. The large tracts
of land held make a sparsely settled
district which is a great disadvan-
tage to a rural community of peo-
ple, many undesirable as neighbors.

cessful life in its widest possibilities?

Sow the Seeds as early in the Spring as possible, roll the ground perfectly level; the grass should be cut often, and never allowed to attain a length of over three inches.
