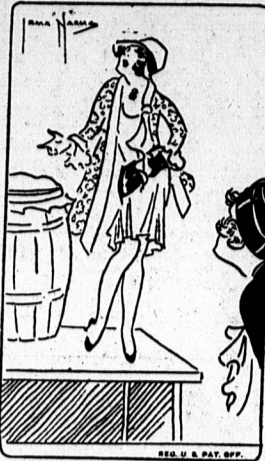

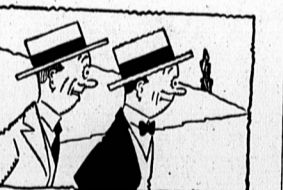

Mr. Adrian Rogerson and Mr. George Campbell paid a visit to Cape Traverse Wharf on Tuesday evening.
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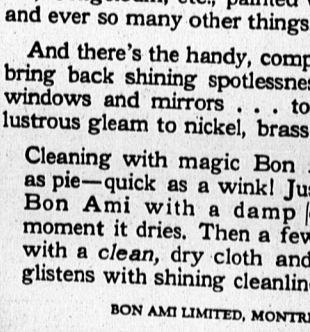
